Supplemental Special Rules of Order for Virtual Attendance at Annual

Supplemental Special Rules of Order for Virtual Attendance at Annual Meeting of Christ Episcopal Church Eureka, California

For Adoption at commencement of the 2022 Virtual Annual Meeting.

Date of 2022 Annual Meeting: February 6, 2022 at 12 PM

I. Preamble

1. Supersede Regular Rules. These Supplemental Special Rules of Order for Virtual Attendance at Annual Meeting (hereinafter, "these Rules") shall supersede the regular By-Laws regarding the holding of annual meetings of the parish, and the Constitution and Canon 36 of the Canons of the Episcopal Diocese of Northern California and to the extent they are in conflict with the regular By-laws, Constitution and Canons, these Rules shall prevail.
2. Purpose. The purpose of these Rules is to facilitate the calling and annual meeting of the parish during the Covid-19 Pandemic, since governmental restraints make it impossible to hold a face-to-face physical meeting of the parish.
3. Rules Adoption. These Rules are to have been adopted by a majority vote of the Vestry at least two weeks prior to the Virtual Annual Meeting, as an amendment to the parish bylaws, and are to be adopted at the beginning of the Virtual Annual Meeting by qualified voting parishioners, who shall also ratify the Rules as adopted by the Vestry.
4. Interpretation of Certain Constitutional and Canonical Terms. For purposes of annual meetings governed by these Rules, these terms shall have the following interpretation: "Annual Meeting": The meeting of clergy and laity of Christ Church Eureka, conducted wholly or in part via remote electronic participation by its members. "seat": The ability to participate in the annual meeting via electronic connection "voice": The right to make oral statements during the annual meeting "vote": The right to cast an electronic poll vote.

II. Connection Information

1. The meeting will be held via zoom. The zoom link and password will be set forth in the Sunday Bulletin two Sundays prior to the Sunday of the Annual Meeting.

III. Opening of Meeting and Quorum

1. Login Time. The Secretary shall schedule the Zoom meeting service to begin at least 10 minutes before the start of each meeting.
2. Signing in and out. Members shall identify themselves as required to sign in to the Internet meeting service, and shall maintain Internet and audio access throughout the meeting whenever present, but shall sign out upon any departure before adjournment.
3. Quorum. Consistent with the Bylaws and Canon 36.3.2, those present at the zoom meeting shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business of the parish.
4. Meeting Managers. The Rector and Senior warden will serve as meeting Managers and Co-hosts for the Hybrid Annual Meeting.
5. Meeting Clerk/Teller. The Meeting Clerk shall be the Clerk of the Vestry, Peg Gardner, and the Election Teller shall be the Parish Administrator, Thomas Swanger.

IV. Conduct of Meeting

1. Technical requirements and malfunctions. Each member is responsible for his or her audio and Internet connections; no action shall be invalidated on the grounds that the loss of, or poor quality of, a member's individual connection prevented participation in the meeting.
2. Forced disconnections. The Rector may cause or direct the disconnection or muting of a member's connection if it is causing undue interference with the meeting. The Rector's decision to do so, which is

subject to an undebatable appeal that can be made by any member, shall be announced during the meeting and recorded in the minutes.

3. Assignment of the floor. To seek recognition by the Rector, a member shall use the Zoom "raise hand" request and await recognition. Once the pending action is completed, the Rector shall clear the online queue.

4. Interrupting a member. A member who intends to make a request that under the rules may interrupt a speaker shall use the Zoom Chat feature for so indicating, and shall thereafter wait a reasonable time for the Rector's instructions before attempting to interrupt the speaker by voice.

5. Motions. **Because the annual meeting will be held via zoom, motions will not be considered. The purpose of the annual meeting will be to receive reports by title, hear the Treasurer's Report and respond to questions re the same, and announce the results of the election for vestry and convention delegates and alternates.**

V. Floor Nominations and Voting

1. Nominations from the Floor. Because there have been numerous announcements, opportunities, and invitations to self-nominate and nominate prior to the Annual Meeting (on Sundays, in Chronicle, and weekly email blasts), no nominations will be accepted from the floor.

2. Voting. **A link to an electronic ballot will be emailed to qualified members on Tuesday February 1. Voting will take place beginning on that date and ending on Friday February 4 at 5:00 p.m. Members may also vote by calling the church office at 707-442-1797 or coming to the church office during office hours (Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday Friday 9 AM – 1 PM) and filling out a ballot. To maintain anonymity, phone votes will only be recorded by the parish clerk (Peg Gardner) and vestry approved election teller (Thomas Swanger).**

3. Voter eligibility. Qualified voters shall be those persons of legal age who, at the time of such meeting, shall be communicants on the records of the Parish for six months, who have communicated in the Parish during the year preceding, and who are Givers of Record and shall have been for six months entered or entitled to be entered upon the books of the Treasurer of the Parish. No person shall be permitted to vote by absentee or proxy ballot. (Canon 36.3 and 36.3.3)

4. Election Results. The Clerk/Teller shall share the results of all ballots received with the Meeting Managers who shall share the election results with the members who are present electronically.

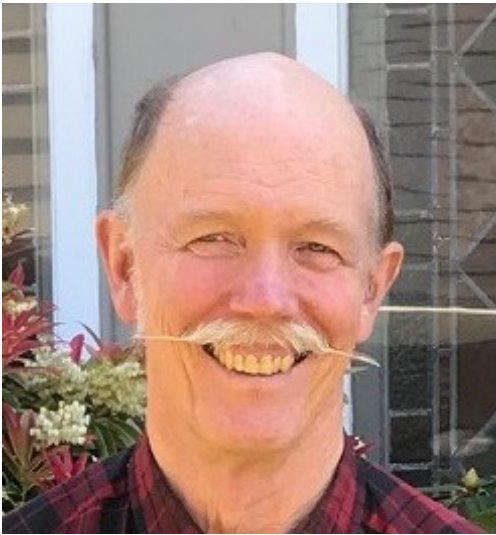

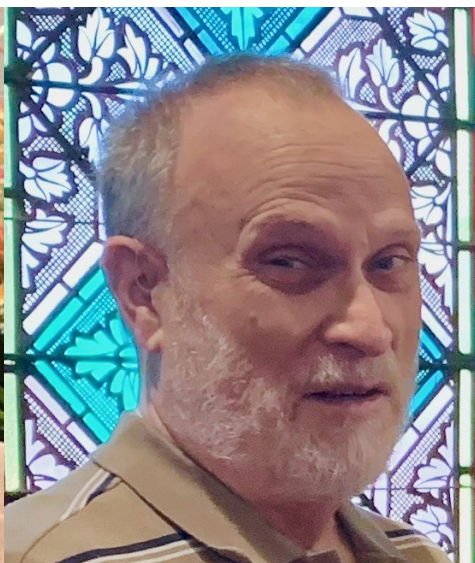

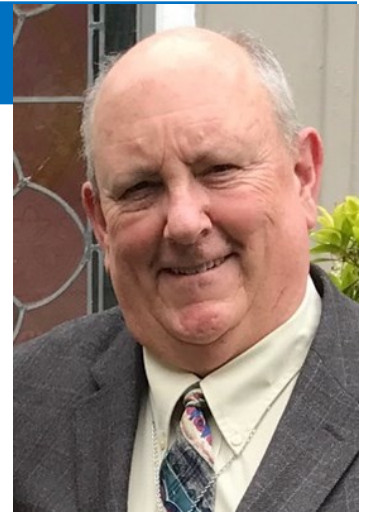

SENIOR WARDEN — Royal McCarthy

It hardly seems possible that another year has come and gone, and what a roller coaster year it has been. It has been an honor to serve as Senior Warden for an additional year. Thank you for all your prayers and support during my tenure as Junior and Senior Warden, they made the tasks much easier.

The major focus for the past year has been dealing with the effects of the pandemic. Thanks to the fantastic efforts of our Parrish Administrator, Thomas Swanger, and our sound guru, Paul Gossard, our online presence has been improving and is becoming a polished presentation. We are closer to developing an online team to allow others to join in putting out our online presence.



In going back over the year, we have accomplished a lot in spite of the challenges of the pandemic. We have continued to provide services on Sundays, initially virtually and as the restrictions were relaxed, in hybrid form. It has been wonderful to see more attending the services in person and hopefully we won't have to take any steps backward as far as attending in person.

Some of the other accomplishments over the last couple of years include:

- The installation of the new cross on the top of the belfry.
- “Remodeled” the Pierson Room, replacing the carpet with a tile floor and repainting the room.
- Repainted the Labyrinth and resealed the floor of the Chapel.
- Created the Father Doug Library.
- Removing the mold on the ceiling of the Nave, in the Chancel, the pews, the restrooms and the Heritage Room.
- Upgraded the Church’s WIFI to cover the entire campus with a more robust system.
- Upgraded the parking lot lighting to LEDs, increasing the light output and lowering the power consumption.
- Cleaned and repaired the south facing stained glass windows in the Church and Chapel as well as the rose window in the Nave and replaced the outer protection over the windows.
- Repaired the arson damage to the front door.
- Completed the installation of the portraits of the Apostles in Lewis Hall.
- Trimmed back the magnolia in the parking lot, removed the weed barrier, and provided a watering manifold that will allow water to get to the roots of the tree hopefully allowing it to bounce back and thrive.

The items that are on the need attention list are:

- Redoing the Church sign at 15th & “H”.
- Converting the Chancel lighting to LEDs to reduce power consumption and reduce the need to change light bulbs.
- Repainting portions of the church.
- Repaving and restriping the parking lot.
- Repairing the retaining wall between the Church office and the education building.

Once again, it has been my honor and privilege to serve as Junior and Senior Warden. I look forward to being able to continue to provide support to the clergy, the incoming Vestry and new Wardens and the Church.

We entered this year with a difficult challenge, and ended the year with the light at the end of the tunnel. With the help of the Cathedral, in Sacramento, and our Re-gathering Committee, we were able to plan our way out of the doom and gloom. We began the year after an excellent Christmas Service. I would like to thank Paul Gossard, Thomas Swanger, Royal McCarthy, and Father Daniel London, for their work with perfecting the live streaming of the services. Our parish has come to the point where our live streamed services have a very polished look.

I would like to thank you all who kept the campus looking great during our Covid-19 shut down. Especially, Jim Hendry and Lyn Klay, for keeping the lawn clean and mowed. Also the folks who tended to the gardens, Julie Cairns, Bev Olson, Lin Chase, Paul Gossard, Wes and Dixie Johnson, Merry Phillips and Thomas Swanger.

At one point during this past year, we were without a Sexton. We have made a decision to contract with a clearing service for the care of the campus. We also have a local service coming in on a schedule to help control our mold problem. This has worked out very well. After a break-in of one of our classrooms, we have organized a small group of parishioners to perform the security check of the campus. Thank you to all who are a part of this group, including those on the back-up list. We have also corrected a problem with the chapel gate to the courtyard. A hand guard has been added above the door handle to prevent someone from getting into the courtyard. A locksmith will be servicing some of the locks and hinges soon. I have obtained an estimate for the repaving of the parking lot, but the alley way needs to be paved first. After several calls to the Public Works Department, repaving of the alleyway may not be in the future plans. There is a bank of lights that are not working in the Nave, that will be addressed next month. All of the outdoor electrical outlets have been replaced with locking covers. Also, all outdoor faucets have been replaced with keyed faucets, to prevent unauthorized water usage. I am still trying to get estimates on gutter cleaning. Small gardens are growing in some places of the gutters.

Thank you all, who have helped in the background to keep the church running and safe.

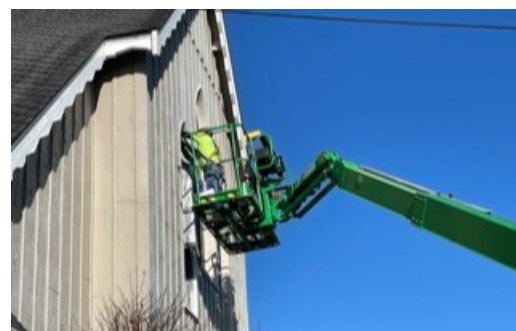

Stained Glass Windows receive conservation work

All of the windows had the existing weathered, cloudy protective covering removed. Next the windows were recemented on the exterior surface. With this process the windows were polished giving them a new luster. Loose paint on the outer surface of millwork was removed and a primer and finish coat of white paint applied. Once that was completed, The new protective coverings were installed along with new perimeter frames crafted onsite.

Each January, the writing of an annual report prompts us to look back over the previous year, identify any memorable events and report them, so that they may become a part of recorded parish history.

As I look back over the months of 2021, the two events that stand out in my mind are the resumption of in-person worship, the restrictions that came with this and the offering of Evensong on the Sundays of Advent. While the importance of in-person worship cannot be underestimated, it has been so wonderful to gather together, lifting our voices, if appropriately masked, in prayer and song, and the addition of Evensong simply enhanced this.

In the fall, Fr. Daniel asked that I should plan a simple, contemplative afternoon Evensong for the four Sundays of Advent; these services were to follow a short recital of seasonal music. With the help and cooperation of Merry Phillips our Music Coordinator, and David Powell our Choir Director, we set to work. We chose music from the service section of our hymnal, to be sung by a small group or Schola, along with seasonal hymns for congregational singing. The scripture readings and complimentary psalms chosen, were based on the order for the service for Advent Lessons and Carols. The four Sundays tracing the story of the coming of Christ, from prophecy to revelation.

Once we entered the season of Advent, each Sunday afternoon into the peace brought by beautiful music, unfolded the serene office of Evensong, comforting, prayerful and holy. It was a reminder of the season, a fitting conclusion to Sunday and a bridge to the season of Christmas. Father Daniel and I took turns officiating, and I thank him, and all who helped, especially Merry Phillips, organist; David Powell, choir director and cantor; Archdeacon Pam Gossard, cantor; and the Schola; Ann Carter, Steve Cole, Caren Diebold, Paul Gossard, and Royal McCarthy. Not to be forgotten was the glorious setting of the church itself, decked out in Advent blue and seasonal greenery with the warm glow of many candles. Thanks go to Kathy Clague and Thomas Swanger for all their work in providing this.

In other areas of parish ministry during 2021, I served as a member of the Regathering Task Force, the Worship Committee, attended clergy meetings, as well as preaching and presiding when asked by Father Daniel.

For most of 2020, in the absence of in-person social time, I hosted a virtual Sunday Coffee Hour on Zoom. As we approached the summer of 2021, and were about to begin in-person worship, the decision was made to discontinue this. Many of the participants were expected to be physically present at church, and the virtual gathering had run its course. My thanks go to Deacon Anne Pierson, Steve Preston and Royal McCarthy who helped with the hosting duties, as well as all our parish participants and visitors; I know their input was appreciated by all. As we move further into 2022, my hope is that there will be a reduction in Covid cases allowing us to resume more traditional in-person social events.

The Covid 19 pandemic has presented us with many challenges, as individuals, families and as a parish community. I am immensely grateful for all the work done by Fr. Daniel, and by our virtual ‘engineers’, Paul Gossard and Thomas Swanger. Without their dedication and willingness to learn, and constantly embrace new and developing aspects of streaming technology, our parish community life would have considerable poorer.

PICTURING THE WORD—ART EXHIBITION OF DAVID LOCHTIE'S PAINTINGS



Christ Church Eureka hosted an exhibition of parishioner David Lochtie's paintings in early December 2021. The paintings were responses to Holy Scripture as illuminated in the sermons of Fr. Daniel. The 30 paintings were created as real-time responses to Sunday services held via Zoom during the COVID lockdown of 2020 and early 2021. In addition, the show offered an invitation for participants to contribute their written impressions as part of a larger collaborative effort to explore the nature of art in the understanding of the sacred. David donated 100% of the painting sales (\$1860) to our outreach efforts with proceeds distributed to The Betty Kwan Chinn Homeless Foundation, The Forgotten Initiative (TFI), Sandy in Honduras and Food for People-The Food Bank of Humboldt County.

Lay Ministries are the many ways those of us sitting in the pews live our baptismal covenant. Each Ministry is exercised in the "gathered" church through various organizations, and through many challenges, as we witnessed during 2021.

We cautiously regathered for worship following guidelines from Bishop Megan. Our Ushers and Greeters were trained to check people in, ensure social distance with adherence to the most recent Covid protocols.

Lectors made an adjustment from ZOOM to in-person or recorded reading, and on Pentecost, the Acolytes once again began duties at the 8am service. Our altar guild prepared the sanctuary for services, concerts and forums. The music department took care of recording, rehearsing, and monitoring wonderful musical offerings including in-person concerts. The technology team has made it possible to continue and even expand our community outreach with streaming services and various You Tube recordings. Our church looks great on the outside, thanks to the behind-the-scenes gardening ministry.

Even though our "back to normal" status has been delayed, one Lay Ministry has remained the same – prayer. Our Prayer Circle is a ministry in which every member can participate.

We may have experienced Pandemic challenges in 2021, but our Lay Ministers were strong and resourceful. Even more far-reaching results are ahead in 2022.



EUCCHARISTIC MINISTERS & ACOLYTES — The Rev. Anne Pierson

For the Acolytes (A) and Eucharistic Ministers (EM), 2021 was a unique year due to the presence of Covid. We started out with a same as usual schedule which completely changed. We stopped offering the chalice at Eucharist and therefore there was no need to schedule EMs. Royal McCarthy and John Patton became our stalwart team of Acolytes for most of the year and then Royal, alone, when John needed to step back. Others stepped forward to serve in John's place as they were able to be trained in our new hybrid service environment by John. Then, intinction was approved by our Bishop Megan and her team of advisors (which include medical professionals) and the Deacons (Pam and I) stepped forward to hold the chalice. It was important to keep the number of those serving in the chancel at a minimum.

Hopefully, after the Omicron variant has peaked and moved on, we can have a semblance of our pre-Covid service and Eucharist. Meanwhile, here we are. I want to thank all who served during 2021 and, in particular, Royal and John. Your participation and ability to adapt were a gift and a treasure. Thank you!



REACHING OUT WITH HELPING HANDS AND HEARTS AT CHRIST CHURCH EUREKA

We at Christ Church share our time, talent and treasure in many ways. We are God’s hands and feet in this world. Read about a number of the ways below and also throughout other reports. Many of our ministries have been impacted by Covid-19, but new opportunities have opened up as well. Our Vestry is committed to increasing our outreach to our neighbors in our local community and the wider world.

- Sending increased regular monthly monetary donations from Christ Church to TFI (The Forgotten Initiative) for its Resource Center for foster families, Betty Chinn Homeless Foundation, Sandy-in-Honduras, and Food for People.
- Sending additional one-time additional contributions to the Food for People capital building campaign, The Forgotten Initiative and Humboldt Domestic Violence Services for direct services.
- Supporting foster children and youth and resource families through TFI with fleece blankets created by Quilters+ for Journey Bags.
- Continuing to collect non-perishables for the Food Bank to meet increased needs due to the pandemic.
- Collecting warm clothing, socks, and bedding for Betty Chinn.
- Funding and assembling two dozen backpacks for students returning to in-person school to be distributed by Betty Chinn.
- Sharing of the proceeds of his art show sales by David Lochtie, who designated that the funds go to Outreach. Thanks to David, additional donations benefited Sandy-in-Honduras, Food for People, Betty Chinn, and TFI (foster children).
- Supporting Discretionary Funds for Fr. Daniel, Archdeacon Pam, and Deacon Ann to enable them to respond to urgent local needs.
- Supporting our church family with medical and other challenges with Prayer Quilts made by members of the Quilters+.
- Including and welcoming strangers, visitors and newcomers who come to worship and break bread with us on Sundays.
- Growing the Helen Person Memorial Scholarship Fund for graduating high school seniors.
- Contributing half of the Stewardship Online Auction proceeds to the Diocesan Fire Disaster Relief Fund.
- Donating to Episcopal Relief & Development (ERD) for Haitian Disaster Relief following the 7.2 disastrous earthquake.

OUTREACH continued

- Underwriting Nature & Forest Therapy Guide Training and tuition for Best Skills Best Churches Training
- Participating with the HIF (Humboldt Interfaith Fellowship) to award its first Community Service Award to the recently retired Steve Watson, Eureka Chief of Police. Fr. Daniel served as master of ceremonies.
- Acknowledging that a portion of our apportionment to the Diocese and programs of TEC (The Episcopal Church) includes outreach ministries.
- Participating in the Afghan Resettlement Team (AFT), a Ministry of the Diocesan Commission for Intercultural Ministries, and partner with World Relief and International Rescue Committee (IRC), through supporting the huge number of Afghan refugees coming to the Sacramento area with the donation of funds to The Center at St. Matthew's, Sacramento, and a warm winter kit for a young boy through the IRC. The need is ongoing.
- Appreciating the designated donations to Outreach programs by a number of individual parishioners and friends of the parish.
- Strengthening our social media and online capacity. Funds from the Stewardship Dinner online auction helped to underwrite improvements. We've reached out to and connected to our church family with online Sunday services, Compline, Sacred Saunters, concerts, weekly e-blasts, emails, Facebook, YouTube, Zoom and the resources on our web page. Technology has made it possible to maintain and reconnect with former parishioners who have moved away. More than that, others in our local community and the wider community in distant places have discovered our church family and built relationships with us. Reaching out near and far through technology has been a real blessing during the Covid-19 pandemic. May we build our 'stream team' and continue to use technology to strengthen these relationships even after the pandemic subsides!

The relationships we build and the programs we support with our time and treasure reflect our values and help to build a better world for all. Thank you, each and every one!

THE CHOIR — David Powell

The Christ Church choir has once again experienced quite the year of change. As Christ Church began to hold services in person, we were advised against having a large group of people singing indoors during a service, and so we needed to find a new sustainable option for the choir. This led to the beginning of the Christ Church Schola (our small choir), which provides an opportunity for members of the choir to bring live music into each service, and for parishioners still participating at home to hear our lovely choral voices leading the hymns every Sunday.

The choir has recently begun meeting in person again, still socially distanced and with new N95 qualified singers masks, in hopes and preparation for the time when it will be safe for the full choir to return to weekly services. While it has been another difficult year full of seemingly monthly changes and adaptations, the members of the Christ Church choir have been unflappable in their desire to continue bringing the ministry of music into the church in any way they can. You can be certain that as soon as it is safe to do so, the choir will return in full voice to shake the rafters with joyous song.





Introduction

Last year I wrote about the explosion of new ideas for creating worship services in the new ‘online era’ of livestreaming that we experienced in 2020. We demonstrated that we were not only determined and resilient, but we were innovative and creative in our approach to keeping our online worship as close as possible to our in-gathering worship experiences.

This year has been a hybrid of approaches and I find it harder to sum up this past year than the year before. It has been full of ups and downs, starts and stops, declines and surges in COVID – a bit of a roller coaster ride for us all!

We went from being fully online with all music recorded (everything for Holy Week and Easter was pre-recorded) to gradually bringing back folks in person to the church, then bringing back singing. By the end of the year, we were back to gathering in person in church, singing in church, and having live music, liturgy, and sermons! Our Christmas Eve Mass was beautiful, and I think many of us felt especially grateful for the gift of re-gathering and live music this year.

As Fr. Daniel mentioned in a recent sermon, there is always a lot of “behind the scenes” activity involved in our efforts and that is especially true for our worship services. Our “Music Team” (Fr. Daniel, David Powell, Paul Gossard, and I) meet weekly, as does our larger, expanded Worship Committee. These meetings are to plan, review, and discuss all matters of worship, with the goal of making our collective worship experience, in this time of pandemic, as transformational and meaningful as possible.

Other groups, such as the Regathering Task Force and the expanded Staff group (which meets once a month) also provide direction and decision-making for worship as well as for the day-to-day operations of the church. We are blessed that Thomas in his many roles keeps us all connected and well-informed.

Instrumentalists and Soloists

For most of the year, our music was pre-recorded and played over Zoom, and initially even that was limited. Over time, we added recordings of service music, virtual choir pieces, and others to the live-stream worship. This involved not just the musicians, but the technical crew as well (Paul Gossard and Francis Rivinus) as well as Thomas Swanger and David Powell (to coordinate the playing of the recordings for the livestream service).

In July we began to discuss a return in in person worship and live music. It was a joy and delight to be back in the church, at the organ console, in real time! And while I missed hearing the voices of the congregation singing, it was such a blessing to have David back in the church, singing the hymns!

This was not a year for inviting guest instrumentalists or soloists, though we were blessed to have Pat Person join us (playing the oboe) for a service later in the year.

Two other instrumentalists who did not get mentioned enough are Paul Gossard (guitar, ukulele, percussion) and Fr. Daniel (guitar). Both have provided music for our services both within the church and outside. Music has been called a “portable theology” – and both these individuals and their traveling guitars (sacred saunters, etc.) are true examples of that!

I would like to express my thanks to Doug Moorehead, for continuing to serve as a substitute organist when needed and to offer his service (like his wonderful jazz piano) for church events. Doug served this parish faithfully for over thirty years, and I am very glad he continues to do so!

I extend grateful thanks to Thomas Swanger as well for being willing to play for the 8 am service when I took a Sunday off. Many churches no longer have an organist; and here we are with three!

Facilities and Musical Instruments

The Kegg organ underwent some repair work this summer (replacing cables for the tremulant) as well as an annual tuning. Last year I noted that the annual cost of tuning had gone up, partly due to fewer churches in the area to share the travel expense. The local organ tuner has retired, so there may be other churches now willing to share the cost of bringing the Brownings (from Turlock) up to Eureka every year.

I confess, because we were not using the instruments, I did not schedule the regular twice a year tuning for all the pianos. But they have now all been tuned. In addition, Bill Ryder has completed extensive work on the Baldwin piano in the Heritage Room. The piano was a gift from the children of Patsy Green (Eris McCarthy's sister). It was in good shape, but it is now in even better shape, and it is a fine instrument for us to have. We have already used it for church events as well as rehearsals for the Eureka Symphony chorus and our choir.

Christ Church Concerts

Many of our usual events were curtailed due to COVID. We chose not to offer our Friday concerts during Lent, because of the amount of work required for pre-recording all our Holy Week and Easter services. However, we offered, for the first time, a series of musical programs accompanied by an Evensong for the four Sundays in Advent. These were well received and were grateful to share in this opportunity to re-gather in person, hear live music, and be present for a live evening worship service. Many thanks to all the musicians involved: Doug Moorehead, Tre Amici (Helen Winfrey, Nancy Streufert, Merry Phillips), Paul Vanden-Branden and Paul Gossard, the schola that sang for Evensong (Pam Gossard, Ann Carter, Royal McCarthy, Paul Gossard, David Powell, Steve Cole), and to Mtr. Lesley and Fr. Daniel for leading the Evensong services. And a very special thanks to Mtr. Lesley for putting together such a lovely service and helping us learn about it.

Continuing our offering of virtual concerts in 2020, we released an Epiphany concert in January and a Pentecost concert in May. We briefly discussed offering a concert in October, but wisely decided (due to time and staff considerations) to “re-release” both our Halloween and Thanksgiving concerts from 2020, giving everyone a chance to listen again or for the first time if they missed it last year. If you have not heard these concerts yet, they are available on YouTube for your listening pleasure any time! Please take the opportunity to thank the musicians who shared their time and talent! And always thanks go to the technical crew as well for these productions.

Music Events and Outside Musical Groups

In November, we welcomed back the Chamber Players of the Redwoods for a live performance – the first concert in over two years! All precautions were taken: proof of vaccination was required at the door, masks were required inside, seating was socially distanced, and seating capacity was limited to 60 (and filled). Fred Tempas, leader of the Chamber Players, expressed it well when he said his “heart was full” at being able to perform live music to a live audience again.

We have stayed connected with the other groups who have used our space, with the hope that one day they will be able to return.

Conclusion

As we begin 2022, it is once again impossible to predict what the year will hold for us. But we have certainly learned to roll with punches and make the best of things. I pray that our corporate worship experiences enable us to continue to provide hope and healing and transformative experiences.

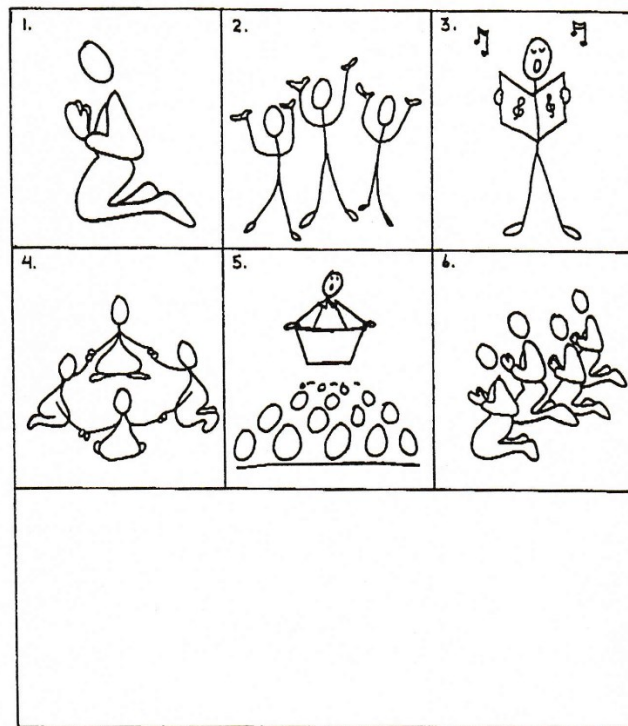

So it was with great interest that I recently purchased a little book (only 79 p.) – it is called *Inspiring Music in Worship: a short course of guided conversations for churches*. Obviously, it is written for a pre-COVID era – but as I read it, I am imagining how it might be used to stimulate some discussions now – via Zoom or email. In-

terested? Let me know! Ideas? Let me know! The exercises offered in the book are conducive to giving more in depth thought to a lot of topics; but the real value of the book is to instigate conversation among ourselves about music and theology.

“Although worship can happen without it, music usually has a significant part to play. Music can really help worship take off. Music, like worship, is difficult to define; yet we all know what the word means. It is an experience common to all, throughout the world. We recognize music in sounds and rhythms of nature as well as those of human making. Music is a creative and expressive art with its origins in a creative God” (p. 76).

The picture below is from a book I’ve mentioned several times in the past: *Music in Churches: Nourishing Your Congregation’s Musical Life*, by Linda J. Clark (p. 102). It was the book that gave me the idea of wanting to learn about Christ Church’s rich traditions and your current views on music in worship. It has been a rewarding, yet challenging, time for the team who find themselves scheduled to serve often. As of this writing, our team is just five (5) people strong and we look forward to Peach and Tom Bond joining the ranks, soon.

In the fall of 2020 Father Daniel deemed it safe to return to the church for our 10:30 online worship service to celebrate the Eucharist. The only people allowed to be present were the Altar party and the Technical Staff; anyone else involved with the service did so virtually. This arrangement continued until February of 2021. Then a few of us were allowed to attend the service. It was not until April 25th that we had the vestry join us in the church, and on May 2nd Anne Pierson joined us also. Thank goodness for the vaccine.

On May 23rd 2021, Pentecost, we had our first in person 8:00AM service in over a year; followed by the 10:30 service which was in person and live streamed. Finally, there was some sense of ‘normalcy’ to our worship. This has continued through Christmas 2021. With this meant the return of other Altar Guild members: Julie Cairns, Marty Vega, and in December a new member joined us, Robin Cardona.

The Altar Guild is one of the many “behind the scene” ministries of Christ Church. Our duties include:

- ✦ Dusting and cleaning the chancel, polishing the brass (railing) and silver vessels, filling the candles with oil and maintaining the wicks (this is necessary for each service conducted). When we meet in person this means the candles are filled between the 8AM and the 10:30AM service. We are also responsible to have the proper seasonal color on the Altar, Pulpit and Bible markers. And to have the vestments ready in the Vesting Room, and for Eucharist the Chasuble is draped on the railing.
- ✦ To prepare the Altar, we remove the protector cloth, which is placed on the Altar to protect the Fair Linen, ensuring that the Fair linen is clean and pressed. Then we bring out the Altar candles and place them on the Altar. The Gospel is turned and marked to the appropriate reading for the service and place it in the front center of the Altar. For Eucharist we place the Missal Stand on the left side of the Altar. The Vested Chalice is placed in the center with the proper burse and veil that corresponds to the frontal. For a Eucharist we also prepare the Credence Table: a clean pressed credence cloth is put on, then the vessels: the water and wine cruets, lavabo and the bread box. A linen lavabo towel is placed in the center. To prepare the Altar, we remove the protector cloth, which is placed on the Altar to protect the Fair linen, ensuring that the Fair linen is clean and pressed. Then we bring out the Altar candles and place them on the Altar. The Gospel is turned and marked to the appropriate reading for the service and place it in the front center of the Altar. For Eucharist we place the Missal Stand on the left side of the Altar. The Vested Chalice is placed in the center with the proper burse and veil that corresponds to the frontal. For a Eucharist we also prepare the Credence Table: a clean pressed credence cloth is put on, then the vessels: the water and wine cruets, lavabo and the bread box. A linen lavabo towel is placed in the center.
- ✦ After the service the Altar and Credence Table are cleared. All the vessels are cleaned and stored in the Sacristy. The linens used for the service are washed and ironed, and the protector cloth is placed back on the Altar.

Prior to in-person worship, when we were virtual The Altar Guild consisted of only a few members.

- ✦ On Saturday we needed to prepare the chancel for Sunday’s virtual worship. Elizabeth Harper-Lawson filled the candles, Thomas Swanger arranged the furniture, and I set up the Altar, and everything else needed for the worship service. On Sunday I usually came before the service to fine tune the chancel, then leave and go to Bob’s office to watch the service on my computer. When the service was over and I knew that everyone had left I would return to the church to clean up. This arrangement continued until early 2021. Eventually a few of us were allowed to attend the actual service, Merry came back to play the organ live and I was allowed to stay in the nave also. Everyone in attendance followed the church COVID protocol established by the Regathering Task Force (RTF)): entered through Lewis hall, wear a face mask at all times, sanitize our hands, take our temperature and record it on the check-in sheet; and when we entered the nave we physically distanced ourselves from one another.

- ✦ February 14th, we had our 150th Anniversary Celebration with a virtual visit with Bishop Megan Traquair, who was Celebrant and Preacher for our Sunday worship. It was a beautiful service. After the service Bishop Megan even attended our virtual coffee hour.
- ✦ After the service we had to change everything to the Lenten hangings, veil the cross and baptismal font, change the prayer desks to the wood ones, etc. in preparation for Ash Wednesday on February 17th.
- ✦ Ash Wednesday had a live-streamed service at noon; which was followed by Ashes To Go in the parking lot at 1PM and 4PM. We had a Lent Pack that we had made:

A set of consecrated Communion wafers for Holy Eucharist during Lent
Candles that were blessed at the Candlemas rite (Feb 7th)
Worship Bulletin for Ash Wednesday
Worship Bulletin for the First Sunday in Lent (Feb 20th)
A Forward Day by Day Daily Devotions booklet
A Sainly Scorecard for those wishing to participate in Lent Madness
Ashes in a container for those who wish to impose the ashes on themselves

- ✦ Some of the Holy Week services were pre-recorded which were done at various times through the month of March: Palm Sunday on March 10th, and The Easter Vigil on March 16th. This required us (Thomas & myself) to change the hangings and decorate the church appropriately for that service: Palm Sunday = red and The Easter Vigil = white. Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Day were live-streamed services. Elizabeth Harper-Lawson was allowed to join us and assist at these services.
- ✦ March 27th we had to have the HOLY WEEK & EASTER PACK ready for drive through pick-up at the Church parking lot. This packet included:

Communion wafers for Holy Eucharist during Holy Week through Easter 2
Worship Bulletins for Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday & Great Vigil of Easter. Saturday April 3rd we did Holy Saturday Sacred Saunter at Sequoia Park.

- ✦ Sacred Saunters (I am in charge of our portable Altar)

During Easter tide we enjoyed sacred saunters on Saturdays at Deacon Anne's home (April 17th through May 22nd). We were limited to 12 attendees, which meant participants had to book online or call the church office to register. All were required to wear masks and socially-distance (six feet apart except immediate households).

In August (Aug 7th- 28th) we celebrated the Eucharist at Sequoia Park. Still masked but did not have to socially-distant ourselves.

October 3rd we celebrated the Feast of Saint Francis and the Blessing of the Animals at Sequoia Park.

The Altar Guild post May 23rd

- ✦ With the return of the 8AM service we welcomed back guild members: Marty Vega and Julie Cairns. What a blessing to have them back.
 - * July 24th (Saturday) was the Deanery Confirmation with Bishop Megan, who was here for the first time since she was selected as Bishop. What a wonderful celebration with two baptisms, eight confirmations, and one reception.
 - * We had one in person and one virtual memorial service this year.
 - * We had a third baptism on September 5, 2021 celebrated during Holy Eucharist on Pentecost 15.

ALTAR GUILD *continued*

✦ For Advent we put out an appeal in the Chronicle for help in preparation for our Christmas celebration. This is when Robin Cardona stepped up to help us. Together we (i.e.: Julie Cairns, Elizabeth Harper-Lawson, Robin and myself) polished candlesticks, alms basins, railing the Processional Cross, Torches, prayer desks, the Eagle and the silver vessels for the Altar and Credence Table.

A big THANK YOU goes out to all our Altar Guild members: Robin Cardona, Julie Cairns, Elizabeth Harper-Lawson, Sara Hines, Marty Vega, and Thomas Swanger. We continue to seek new members in this very rewarding Ministry, please consider joining us.

**** Due to unforeseen affects of Covid, the Board of Trustees elected to keep all churches under their 2021 Congregational Ranges.**

Compensation Ranges include a 2.70% COLA approved by the Board of Trustees (BoT) for 2022. While the Social Security Admin. is currently projecting a 6%, COLA, the BoT chose to use the 2022 COLA for Federal government employees. The BoT recommends vestries consider offering a higher COLA if they are able to do so.

Compensation Ranges include: regular salary, housing, allowance for social security, etc. The ranges do not include health insurance, travel, pension, education, etc.

Transitional Deacon should be paid at 90% of Range "B" Base (100% when ordained a priest).

Diocesan executive staff are paid at Range "E"; program staff are paid per hire letter.

All other ordained clergy, if employed by a congregation must be compensated at Range "B" or greater. This is prorated based on full time equivalent.

For regional missionaries combine total points from each church. Below 120 points, minimum is Range "B" Base plus \$1,500. For 120 points and higher, minimum is Range "C" Base plus \$1,500. Maximum is Range "C".

For Congregations receiving assistance, maximum clergy salary is Range "B" Base.

See Article V, Section 5 of the Constitution of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Northern California for guidance on Lay Delegates to Convention.

*One additional Delegate is allowed for every 100 Congregational Points, in the previous year, above the Diocesan Standard.

Total general operating fund costs year to date were \$272,372.

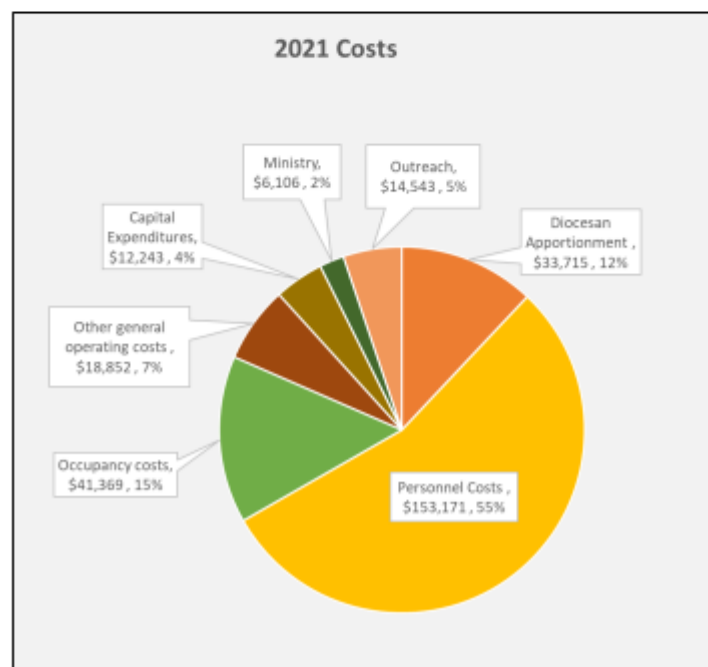
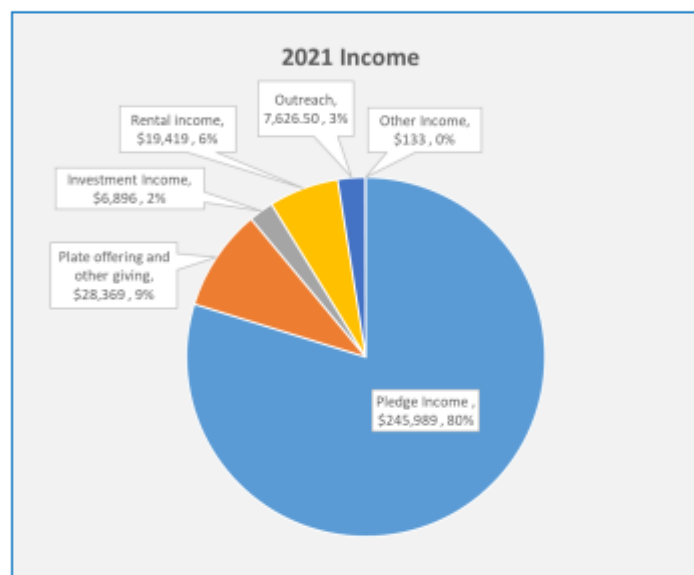
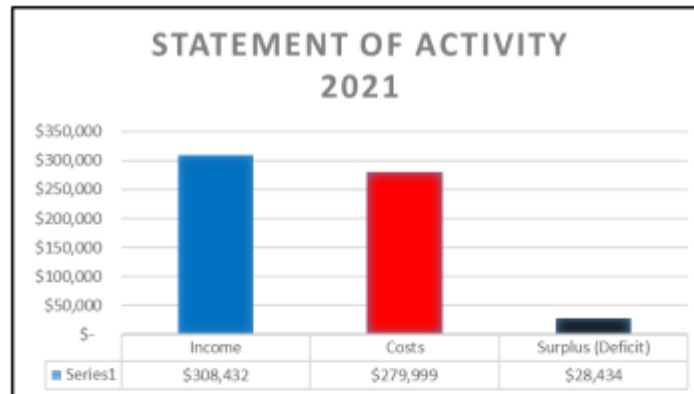
