



Where we seek to glorify God, follow Jesus Christ, and serve all people through the power of the Holy Spirit, as a community of companions walking together in the Way of Christ's Love for all.



As we approach the final Sundays of the liturgical year, we are confronted with some of the more puzzling teachings of Jesus. On the first Sunday of the month, we are confronted with a particularly challenging teaching in which Jesus says, "Call no one on earth your father" (Matthew 23:9). If Jesus wants us avoid calling anyone on earth father, then aren't we disobeying our Lord every time we address a priest, such as myself, as "Father"? Moreover, aren't we disobeying Jesus every time we refer to our own biological fathers as "father"? Jesus also tells his followers to refrain from calling anyone on earth "teacher." The fact that these words ("father" and "teacher") are used frequently in church settings makes this teaching even more confusing.

On the second Sunday of November, we read the Parable of the

Bridesmaids in which five bridesmaids refuse to share their oil with others. The poor bridesmaids who need more oil are then cast out of the wedding banquet and refused re-entry by the bridegroom who says, "I do not know you" (Matthew 25:12). Then on the third Sunday of November, Jesus tells the Parable of the Talents in which a servant is severely reprimanded for essentially being financially conservative. The master in the parable condemns the poor servant as a "worthless slave" who should be thrown into the outer darkness where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth! (Matthew 25:30).

If you're curious to hear how I, *Father* Daniel, will interpret and preach on these Gospel passages (including the passage about not calling anyone "father"), then be sure to come to church each Sunday this month; and please pray for your rector because I'm *also* curious about how I'm going to preach on them! I honestly don't know yet! Although I'm familiar with the superficial and bland interpretations that many of us learned while growing up, I find most of them deeply unsatisfying and frankly soporific in the face of the Gospel's profoundly destabilizing and shocking mystery. And for me, that might be one of the main points of these teach-


ings: to wake us up and to get us to pay attention (which is good preparation for Advent). Jesus wants us to wrestle with his endlessly puzzling and yet life-giving words.

I invite you to read Matthew 23:1-12 and Matthew 25 this month and reflect on these strange teachings of Jesus, ruminate on them throughout the day, and let them read you. Don't be afraid to ask tough questions and don't rush towards easy answers. As I continue to wrestle with the perplexing words of Jesus, I remain comforted and encouraged by the following advice from the poet Rainer Maria Rilke, which I offer to you as well: "Be patient toward all that is unsolved in your heart and try to love the questions themselves, like locked rooms and like books that are now written in a very foreign tongue. Do not now seek the answers, which cannot be given you because you would not be able to live them. And the point is, to live everything. Live the questions now. Perhaps you will then gradually, without noticing it, live along some distant day into the an-



swer."

# Happy All Hallows Eve, dear Christ Church friends

Tomorrow is All Saints' Day. Tomorrow, I will remember the third anniversary of the last Eucharist I shared with my Dad, on Sunday, November 1, 2020. All of us were present with Dad and Mom on that day as we worshiped online with the people of the National Cathedral, and we gathered around Dad's hospital bed as a visual representation of the church universal, and shared bread and wine. We heard the text for the day from Revelation: "They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat; for the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes." We all sang, "For All the Saints (who from their labors rest)." The sublime solo and choir music was jazz-inspired, Dad's favorite. It was the last time I saw him smile.

We were all with Dad and Mom in their home on that day: Perry, Linden, me, and Wren and Erik, who had gotten married less than a month earlier, here in Humboldt County, in Cheatham Grove. Dad was able to greet Erik as the newest member of the family. Now, as we await the birth of Wren and Erik's first child and my first grandchild, I'd like to imagine that Dad might have also been able to see into the future and give thanks, as we do in the present, for that child, his future great-grandchild, through his daughter Jeri and his granddaughter Wren.

**JOY AT JOY MASS:** After our first five Joy Mass Family Services in October, we can report that the children, parents, grandparents, and other adults attending are indeed experiencing a joyous time of worship and community-building. With visuals on the 75" TV, guitar-led singing, fun story-time, a meaningful confession and offering, a simplified Eucharist, and a snack afterward, children and adults alike are finding new meaning on a Sunday morning. As Fr. Daniel said in the *Times-Standard* article on September 30th, the goal of the Joy Mass Family Service is "to provide a new, fresh and fun way for children to come to Jesus and to give them the greatest gift they'll ever receive: a relationship with the living God." We will continue these services, and hope that over time they also bring new families into the larger life of Christ Church.

STEADFAST AND GROWING SINCE 1870: This phrase is part of our church logo; you know, the one with the Lamb, the cross, and palm branches. If you look around on Sunday mornings, the truth of that phrase is clear. The people of Christ Church have been returning post-pandemic. And, we have been seeing more and more visitors, some traveling away from home, and some local residents. Several new folks have been returning weekly and are becoming part of the family! We welcome our new siblings. Take time to chat with visitors or new worshippers, either after services in the reception line or during Coffee Hour. They will feel less like strangers in a strange land, and you will find new siblings in Christ who can enrich your life as well.



**LEADERSHIP SERVICE:** It's not too early to begin thinking about whether you are called to stand for election to the Vestry at the Annual Meeting in early 2024. Please speak with Fr. Daniel, other clergy, the Wardens, or current Vestry members if you need information on what is involved in this central leadership role in our parish. We will also elect five lay delegates and two lay alternates for the 2024 Diocesan Convention, which will be virtual/online (so no traveling required).

**TREASURER NEEDED:** After about 20 years, our excellent Treasurer, Dr. Bob Hines, is retiring, and we are looking for a new Church Treasurer, to be elected at the Vestry's Organizing Meeting after the February 4th Annual Meeting. If you are interested, or curious, please speak with Fr. Daniel.

**COFFEE HOUR:** Our Leader for the post-10:30 Coffee Hour, Lynne Bean, is revising our coffee hour ministry, by forming separate teams of members to set-up, clean-up, and bring food. The goal is for each team to serve only once a month. A few have been doing so much up to this point, and they're getting tired! In order for this vitally important ministry of outreach, hospitality, and fellowship to thrive, we need more people to step up and serve. **DIOCESAN CONVENTION:** By the time you read this, the 2023 Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Northern California will be over. It is on Friday and Saturday, November 3 and 4, at Faith Church in Cameron Park. Our clergy, led by Fr. Daniel, five elected lay delegates (Paul Gossard, Daniel Hafer, Elizabeth Harper-Lawson, Catherine Mace, and Steven Preston) and two elected lay alternates (Roni Carlson and Lin


Chase) represent you in this important decision-making gathering of our Church. There are five Resolutions being considered; three petitions to General Convention: to add Howard Thurman to the Church Calendar; to advocate for "Migration with Dignity"; and to amend Church Canons on Holy Communion. There are two Resolutions to amend our Diocesan Canons: to allow Deacons to be Deanery Deans; and on Appointments to the Disciplinary Board. There is also a Petition to change a church's status, and there are elections to the Standing Committee and Board of Trustees. There are also many appointments being announced, and reports from the Treasurer, other officers, and the Deaneries, Commissions, and Committees. There will be a keynote speaker and the Bishop's Address on Friday, and Eucharist that evening, with additional business and closing dismissal on Saturday. This year there is a smaller exhibit area for Commissions and Ministries. Next year's Convention will be virtual/online, since the "Fearless Faith Revival" is on April 27th in Sacramento and Roseville; Christ Church will be a "remote location" for the evening event with Presiding Bishop Michael Curry.

## Safe Church Creates Holy Space

May 2022 Office of Development

The guiding principle of Safe Church is to protect the vulnerable and offer the opportunity for us, as Episcopalians, to be good neighbors to one another. The new and updated program, <u>Safe Church</u>, <u>Safe Communities</u>, was launched in the summer of 2021. Safe Church, Safe Communities provides new and updated training modules for clergy, laity, and parish staff. These resources give dioceses and parishes across the church the tools necessary to ensure that the most vulnerable among us find an Episcopal Church community of faith that is welcoming and safe.

At the present time we have 25 individuals representing our Joy Mass Volunteers, Eucharistic Ministers, Staff, Vestry, and Altar Guild completing their coursework.

Safe Church Model Policies were adopted in 2017 and can be found on The Episcopal Church's website. They include model policies for safe ministries, for children and youth, and for vulnerable adults. The 79th General Convention authorized the formation of The Task Force to Develop Model Sexual Harassment Policies and Safe Church Training. The task force presented a report to the 80th General Convention outlining its progress and recommendations—recommendations that included the Safe Church, Safe Community program. At the heart of this work is the goal that all Episcopal parishes and dioceses be holy and safe places, communities from which we join to build a church that looks and acts like Jesus, where each of us is welcome and included.

# LOOKING FOR A CHURCH TREASURER

Our Church Treasurer, Bob Hines, is retiring after more nearly 20 years of serving this Parish. From our Church Constitution: The Treasurer shall be elected by the Vestry and serve until a successor is elected. The Treasurer may, but need not, be a member of the Vestry. The Treasurer shall perform the usual functions of



such office and such duties as may be prescribed in Parish Constitution. At the Annual Meeting the Treasurer shall present to the Parish a full and accurate statement of all monies received and paid during the year ... [Constitution of Christ Church Parish {DC 33.6 and DC 34.5} as amended January 22, 2023]

What are the usual functions of the office? The church treasurer is a voluntary official responsible for monitoring, recording, and managing the offerings, donations, and tithes paid by church members. The Treasurer works with the Rector, Wardens, Vestry and Finance Committee to coordinate the church's finances, such as bookkeeping and money output, into church activities. It is important to regulate its inflow and outflow and keep a proper record to ensure transparency and accountability to the church and diocese. This is where the church treasurer (and assistant treasurer) comes in and manages most of the church's financial matters such as record keeping, depositing of funds, payroll, investments, budgeting, tax filing, etc.

If you are interested in serving as our next Treasurer, please speak with Fr. Daniel.

# Replace Single Use Dryer Sheets and Fabric Softener with Wool Dryer Balls

Wool Dryer Balls are an all-natural reusable laundry solution. Liquid Fabric Softener and Dryer Sheets soften clothes and reduce static cling by coating our clothes with chemicals. Wool Dryer Balls soften clothes by fluffing fabrics as they tumble in the dryer. Misting them with water or pinning a safety pin to them before adding dryer balls to the dryer can help reduce static cling. Tumbling your small to medium sized loads with just 3 wool balls can reduce drying time by as much as



25% as well! That's a big win win! And to add another win to the list, you can buy locally sourced wool dryer balls at the farmers' market.

Did you know Wool Dryer balls (just \$9 at the Foggy Bottoms Boys <a href="https://www.foggybottomsboys.com/">https://www.foggybottomsboys.com/</a>) last up to 1000 loads and they are compostable? One Thousand loads is the equivalent of 5 large boxes of Bounce or eight 88 oz. bottles of Downey. Using the wool dryer balls instead of dryer sheets or liquid softener results in a cost savings between \$45 and \$80 just for the product. Add in the energy savings from reduced drying time and it starts to add up. Just throw your wool balls in the compost when they have outlived their

useful life.

According to the Environmental Working Group (ewg.org), chemicals in fabric softeners include Quats (quaternary ammonium compounds) that are known to trigger asthma and may be toxic to the reproductive system; fragrances which can cause allergies, dermatitis and breathing difficulties; and preservatives and colors that are also known to trigger asthma and skin allergies, some are toxic to marine life and others have been linked to cancer.

Minutes of the most recent Vestry meetings, Outreach, and Financial Reports are always posted on the Lewis Hall bulletin board. OCTOBER 22ND MEETING: At its regular meeting, after opening prayer by Fr. Daniel, he led a "Check-In" time, an opportunity for Vestry members to share something for which they were thankful.

The Financial Report through September was reviewed and received.

Vestry approved the minutes of the September 24th Vestry Meeting and the written reports from the Rector, Senior Warden, Junior Warden, Outreach Committee, Green Team, Pet Food Donations, and Joy Mass Team.

Fr. Daniel reviewed highlights from his written report.

Senior Warden Steve Preston asked for any questions from his written report, of which there were none.

Junior Warden Jim Hendry reported on the cost estimate of \$1,000 per door to put windows in three of the classroom doors, to comply with our insurance inspection and Diocesan recommendations. He stated he could install them himself for much less, but there would still be significant materials costs. Discussion of current use of the nursery, toddler, and Godly Play rooms during Joy Mass indicates that the doors are kept fully open, with baby gates, so Vestry decided such modifications were not needed at this time. There was discussion of other general maintenance needs, and Fr. Daniel updated Vestry on considerations being made for recruiting a part-time Sexton to address these.

Archdeacon Pam Gossard reported on her activities, and her involvement with husband Paul co-chairing the Prayer Team for the Diocesan April Revival.

Robin Cardona reported on the successful first four weekly Joy Mass Family Services, with a varying number of children and adults attending, there being 4-10 children and 10-15 adults most Sundays. Volunteers from the Team and Vestry have been doing weekly cleaning of the facilities being used. At Fr. Daniel's request, another 5' x 3' banner will be ordered, to be installed at the Chapel's G Street entry doors, to be paid from the ECS grant. Steve Preston shared a report from Thomas that about \$1,000 of the \$3,500 grant remained.

Steve Preston and others reported on the Stewardship BBQ Lunch and Auction on Saturday, October 14th in Lewis Hall. Everyone agreed that the attendance was very good and that everyone seem to enjoy themselves. The presentations, while a bit lengthy, were well-received. The auction raised \$1,650 (for the Green Team energy efficiency assessment) and more than \$300 was received in the "table bags" to defray the costs of the luncheon. Many thanks were expressed for the efforts of the volunteers who made this a success.

Steve Preston reported for the Green Team that the next round of energy efficiency assessments will be scheduled in early 2024 (probably in January) and that we should be ready to take part.

Fr. Daniel updated Vestry on discussions by the Personnel Committee on the possible hiring of a part-time Sexton. The discussion included reviewing and modifying the existing job description. He will contact the potential Sexton to initiate discussion.

Senior Warden Steve Preston reported that he had met briefly today with the co-leaders of the Emergency Response Team, and that they will meet together to review the mission of the Team, discuss how and when to begin recruiting parishioners to the Team, and make recommendations to him to relay to Vestry.

Peg Gardner reported that the Afghani refugee family that St. Alban's had sponsored in Arcata, with our support, had successfully relocated to the Sacramento area where an apartment was waiting for them. Steve Preston added that we had sent a bedroom and a bathroom (Re)Start bin to St. Alban's for them, and that St. Francis and St. Alban's had provided cleaning and kitchen bins.

Fr. Daniel reported that we are in discussion with Diocesan Missioner Mark Dibelka and Blue Lake Rancheria about us hosting a Disaster Preparedness Fair next year. He also reported that Canon Julie Wakelee will facilitate our Mutual Ministry Review on Saturday, November 18th, from noon- 4:00 pm.

The question of adapting the new Diocesan Diversity Statements was referred to an ad hoc committee. Robin and Elizabeth volunteered to join Fr. Daniel and Steve Preston in formulating and recommending adapted statements.

Fr. Daniel, Archdeacon Pam, and Steve Preston reported on additional planning for the April 27, 2024 "Fearless Faith Revival" that will be at St. John's in Roseville, with Christ Church as a "remote location."

There was discussion of the need for landscaping and irrigation in the strip of land between the office building and the new Fish Memorial Wall. Junior Warden Jim Hendry will consult with others and bring a plan back for Vestry approval. There was consensus that it could be paid from the Jeanne and Robert Fish Memorial Fund, which had paid for the wall, walkway, and meadow landscaping.

Compensation levels for staff were discussed. Vestry voted that it be church policy that all employees must be paid at least the equivalent of minimum wage with immediate effect.

There was review and approval of adjustments made to the recently-adopted Facilities Use Fees and Application/Agreement form. These changes were made based on actual use in recent facilities rentals.

Finally, Vestry voted to call the 2024 Annual Meeting and Election for Sunday, February 4, 2024.

After a very full and productive meeting, and forty minutes overtime, Archdeacon Pam closed the meeting with a dismissal.

The next Vestry meeting will be on Sunday, November 19th at 1 pm in the Pierson Room.
