Thomas Merton in Eureka this Pentecost!

One of my first visits to Eureka was back in 2012 during a road trip with two close friends and fellow admirers of the world-renowned Trappist monk Thomas Merton⁻¹ We called our trip a "Mertonian pilgrimage" since we visited several places that Thomas Merton wrote about in his journals during his visit: Mount Shasta, the Avenue of the Giants, the Lost Coast, and the Redwoods Monastery. Little did I know at the time that I would end up living in Eureka six years later and serving as the rector of Christ Episcopal Church. Also, little did I know that our trip would be recorded on the final page of the book *Thomas Merton in California*, which contains the largest remaining uncatalogued repository of Merton's legacy, including the final conference talks that he gave in the US before he died.



One of my fellow pilgrims was Professor David Odorisio who recently edited the book *Thomas Merton in California*, in which he writes, "My first pilgrimage behind the 'redwood curtain' was co-authored alongside Robert K. Peach and Daniel DeForest London, introducing me to Redwoods Monastery and the Lost Coast over a decade ago. The seeds for this project were planted then and there."²

David Odorisio visited Christ Church back in 2019, when he joined us for our Stations of the Cross Sacred Saunter and then preached at our Good Friday Solemn Liturgy. He visited us again with his fiancé Joanna in August 2021 when they participated in our Feast of the Transfiguration Sacred Saunter. During his last visit, Dave had just finished editing a volume titled *Merton & Hinduism: The Yoga of the Heart* and told me about his crazy



Since August of 2021, I've been eagerly anticipating the publication of Merton's California talks (which came out in January of this year) as well as David's next visit to Christ Church, as part of his book tour.



Three years after I first learned about the idea for the book and twelve years after "the seeds for the project" were first planted, David Odorisio is now finally coming to Christ Church to bring us the wisdom of Thomas Merton.

On Saturday May 18, David will lead a workshop on Thomas Merton that will include presentations, conversations, Centering Prayer, and lunch! You will not want to miss this amazing opportunity. This book has put Eureka and Humboldt County on the map for tens of thousands of Thomas Merton fans and contemplatives around the world. So, let's be sure to embrace this opportunity.

I look forward to celebrating Pentecost this year with you, David Odorisio, and Thomas Merton! In conclusion, I offer the following prayer composed by Merton himself: "My Lord God, I have no idea where I am going. I do not see the road ahead of me. I cannot know for certain where it will end, nor do I really know myself, and the fact that I think I am following your will does not mean that I am actually doing so. But I believe that the desire to please you does in fact please you. And I hope I have that desire in all that I am doing. I hope that I will never do anything apart from that desire. And I know that if I do this you will lead me by the right road, though I may know nothing about it. Therefore will I trust you always though I may seem to be lost and in the shadow of death. I will not fear, for you are ever with me, and you will never leave me to face my perils alone."



On Yom HaShoah we remember the more than six million Jews who perished in the Holocaust, and also more than 200,000 Romani people, 250,000 people with disabilities, and 9,000 gay men. This memorial is especially difficult this year as we are reeling from the shock of the brutal October 7 Hamas attack on Israel, and the six months of war that have devastated Gaza and claimed the lives of more than 30,000. We owe it to the younger generations to do all we can to turn the world away from fanaticism and toward compassion, learning to truly love our neighbors as ourselves. With the rise in antisemitic incidents and crimes nationally and locally, and heated debate over the war, this is a particularly difficult time for our Jewish community. We will deeply appreciate welcoming the public to the synagogue for an evening of beautiful music, wisdom sharing and prayer.

Our Larger Community

In early February of 2018, in the middle of a bad flu season, I chose to make two changes to my routine. As I was awaiting surgery for breast cancer at UCSF and wanted to avoid catching the flu and possibly delaying that surgery, I began to wear a mask, especially in urban San Francisco. And secondly, Perry and I began to worship online.



In those days, it was hard to find consistent live streaming by any mainline parish or congregation. When I was Priest-in-Charge at St. Francis', Perry had faithfully recorded my sermons and posted them on YouTube, but we hadn't dared to livestream the entire service.

The services Perry and I discovered and which fed us in those days when so much was still uncertain were those of the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. The Very Rev. Randy Hollerith, Dean of the Cathedral, and other clergy and lay leaders brought us an experience of corporate worship, exquisite music, and powerful preaching. We viewed the YouTube service on our TV monitor, used the sound of our speakers, and felt as if we were "in the room." We brought out our hymnals, sang, stood, prayed, and felt ourselves to be fully present at the Eucharist. Those services buoyed my spirit, kept me healthy, and helped me to look forward in hope and trust.

Throughout the summer and fall, as I received chemotherapy followed by radiation, I often wouldn't have the strength or desire to attend a local service. We continued to worship with the Cathedral, and supported them with our offerings and prayers.

By early 2019, my hair had grown back, my energy had returned, and I was returning to local preaching and presiding. It was a lovely year.

Then in March of 2020, the world seemed to tilt on its axis in a way no one had seen in at least 100 years. We couldn't gather safely and many congregations began to explore how we might continue to worship remotely. What was before a form of outreach became a necessity if congregations, and their members, were to survive. We became familiar with Zoom, YouTube, and in health care settings, Telemedicine.

As I was planning to write about this subject, I remembered that my longtime friend Marty Vega had participated in an early form of live streaming here at Christ Church, and asked her about her experience. She said that within six months of joining Christ Church with her husband Dan, Rector Ron Griffin asked her to be the camera technology person. She recalls that Christ Church had a 1-year subscription to an early form of streaming (maybe early YouTube). She used a laptop. There was a single camera and there was no audio other than what existed in the nave. She could zoom slightly to the pulpit, and when the gospel was read from the middle aisle, there was a mark on the floor where the reader needed to stop (a bit like theater blocking, it seems), or that person couldn't be viewed on the video.

Since then, and especially since COVID, our parish has invested in wonderful technology that makes it easy and a real blessing for those who are ill, undergoing treatment, traveling, homebound, or distant, to join us. The cameras are adjustable and nimble. The sound system is mostly without glitches. It comes close to capturing the experience of being "in the room." On March 3 when I was Celebrant, I was honored to be able to walk to Mary McNelis' pew and offer her a birthday blessing on the day she turned 95. Marty was worshiping remotely with us at that service, and she commented later that Thomas' choice to follow me with the camera was nothing short of "stunning."



My mother, Joni Gray, is also a regular remote worshiper, whenever Perry and I are present. She relocated to a different community, Thousand Oaks, CA, in 2022, and although she sometimes visits a local congregation, she often prefers to be with us. She can see Perry and me when we sit near the front, and when I turn and wave to her at the beginning of the service, she feels included. She also appreciates the "spiritual Communion" offered to her at the end of the Eucharist.

If you haven't seen any of the YouTube videos which remain on the Christ Church Eureka YouTube channel after the live streaming, I highly recommend them. I just watched the videos from last Saturday's revival (the Labyrinth Walk, the Hymn Sing, and Rashad's poem, which were all recorded at Christ Church). You might review any of the Feast Day services with their special music and unique flavors – Easter Vigil, Christmas Eve, Pentecost - or the more solemn services like Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. The Zoom recordings of Centering Prayer with Fr. David Shewmaker, Fr. Daniel's education videos during the COVID lockdown, and the ones he shared from his sabbatical are also well worth visiting again.

But reviewing and appreciating past recordings is not quite the same as watching them for the first time, especially live, in a spirit of worship. There's no doubt that people who worship with us remotely are part of our community. Part of their unique experience includes being told how many are waiting and if they are the first, second, third - and of having an unobstructed view of those who go up for the Eucharist. Marty comments that she feels, "I'm part of those people," and my mother agrees. "It's a real blessing," she says. (If you are local and would like to receive consecrated hosts for worship from home, they can be obtained by request from the church office.) Mom especially enjoys watching Perry and me when she can see us, and feels that she is with us in worship. She downloads the bulletin and sings, using her 1982 Hymnal. She comments that the music is wonderful, that the live streaming is very professionally done, and that she extends her thanks to all of you.

Many thanks from me also to the members of the Stream Team, for all your dedication and work to make the service accessible for everyone: Thomas Swanger, Heidi Erickson, John Patton, Michael Tipton, Paul Gossard, Royal McCarthy, Steve Preston, and Perry Gray-Reneberg. God bless you in your generous service to the larger Body of Christ!

2024's Line-up For "Sundays at 4" Concerts at Christ Church

In 2009, the original concerts committee established the "Sundays at 4" summer concert series. The idea was to offer free, informal and educational concerts to the community, featuring local musicians and promoting music for the pipe organ and other instruments. The series has continued to the present day, with only a brief hiatus during the pandemic. And even then, we managed to offer several virtual concerts throughout the liturgical year in place of the live summer series.

I will never forget the inaugural concert – I presented a lecture/demonstration on The Art of the Chorale Prelude, Sunday, June 28, 2009. I think there were about ten people in attendance and I was grateful for each one! If you attended any of the concerts last summer, you'll know that the size of the audience has increased substantially, as well as the quality of the programs!

Plans are underway for this summer's concerts, and this is what we have so far:

Sunday, June 23, 2024

"From Greek Hydraulis to 'King of Instruments': a lecture/demonstration at the Kegg Pipe Organ"

Presented by Merry Phillips, the program will include a brief history of the pipe organ, a "tour" of the mechanics of the instrument as well as a demonstration of some of the techniques an organist uses to navigate all those keyboards, buttons, knobs, and pedals. Selected music will show off the diverse sounds a pipe organ makes and showcase some of the special features of the Kegg pipe organ, installed at Christ Church in 2008.

Sunday, July 28, 2024

We hope to have the Ferndale Community Choir return to Christ Church for a memorial concert in honor of the late Betty Diehl, the founder and long-time director of the Choir. Planning is underway.

Sunday, August 25, 2024

Nothing says "summertime" like a live band concert, and we look forward to having the Scotia Band, under the baton of Dr. Kenneth Ayoob, return to play at Christ Church!

Since its formation in 1935 by a group of individuals in The Pacific Lumber Company town of Scotia, CA, the Scotia Band has continued to serve Humboldt County communities in many ways. Their spirit of dedicated public service enriches our northcoast community.

All three concerts are free and open to the public. Voluntary donations are gratefully accepted. In addition, this summer the concerts committee will be raffling a quilt as a fundraiser for Christ Church Concerts. Raffle tickets will be available to purchase at each concert and during Sunday coffee hours. The drawing (drum roll please!) will be held at the last concert.

Methodists Approve Full Communion with Episcopal Church

The United Methodist Church's General Conference has agreed by a 95 percent majority to accept a proposed full-communion agreement with the Episcopal Church. The Episcopal Church's General Convention must also approve the agreement before full communion becomes a reality.

Resolution A-049, filed by the Standing Commission on Ecumenical and Interreligious Relations for consideration at this summer's General Convention, affirms the goal of full communion, but does not yet ask for approval of such a relationship.

Approval of the full-communion agreement, "A Gift to the World: Co-Laborers in the Healing of Brokenness," was part of the General Conference consent calendar, so it was not debated. A United Methodist leader praised the approval after the vote on April 30.

"We wanted to lift up and recognize this moment," said the Rev. Gary Graves, secretary of the General Conference. "You adopted the full communion relationship with the Episcopal Church in the United States that has been worked on for many years."

Hundreds of General Conference delegates this step toward greater church unity a standing ovation.

Like the Episcopal Church's full communion with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and several smaller churches, this agreement would recognize the validity of the Eucharist in both churches, and would

enable the churches to share clergy when approved by the respective bishops.

The United Methodist Church had paused consideration of the agreement until it resolved questions of Methodist teaching on same-sex marriage, and related departures from the United Methodist Church by conservative congregations. Roughly a quarter of conservative congregations have left the United Methodist Church, and most have joined the Global Methodist Church.

Last week, General Conference approved a division of the United Methodist Church into four regions. The full communion agreement with the Episcopal Church would apply only to United Methodist churches in the United States.

A one-page summary about the proposed agreement lists these points of agreement between the churches:

- A belief in Jesus Christ as Savior
- A belief in the Holy Trinity as formulated in the Apostles and Nicene Creeds.

- A belief in Scripture as "containing all things necessary for salvation," and as the primary rule for the life of the church.
- The practice of Baptism as the initiation into the life of Christ through the Church.
- The sacrament of the Eucharist (the Lord's Supper, Holy Communion) as a means of divine grace that sustains and deepens our faith and that contains the "Real, personal, living presence of Jesus Christ." (from *This Holy Mystery*, 2004)
- The historic pattern of a three-fold ordained ministry in Bishops, Presbyters and Deacons, open to both women and men.
- That prayer and holiness of heart and life are ways of growth in the Christian faith. That pursuit of social action and justice is an inherent practice of Christian discipleship.

The Episcopal Church has a long history of seriously pursuing unions with other American Protestant churches that ultimately foundered on questions around sacramental validity and holy orders. A Concordat of union with the Congregationalist Church was seriously pursued in the 1920s, and unity negotiations with the Presbyterian Church in the United States extended for over a decade in the late 1930s and 1940s before ultimately being abandoned. A unity plan between the Methodist Conference and the Church of England was approved by the Methodists in 1968, but defeated twice in General Synod by the combined opposition of evangelicals and Anglo-Catholics.



This latest round of full communion negotiations may find more support, because the agreement stops short of church union. In 2014, the Anglican -Methodist International Commission for Unity in Mission declared in its

statement <u>Into All the World: Being and Becoming Apostolic Churches</u> that all serious theological differences have been resolved and that the next step should be full communion between Anglican provinces and their local Methodist churches or conferences. A full communion agreement has been in place between the Church of Ireland and the small Methodist Church in Ireland for nearly a decade, and the Church of Ireland's thenprimate, Archbishop Richard Clarke, <u>reported</u> to the Anglican Consultative Council in 2016 that the relationship had been especially helpful for shared rural ministry.

On May 1, General Conference also <u>voted</u> 692-51 to lift its 40-year ban on the ordination of "self-avowed, practicing homosexuals" and to lift penalties for conducting same sex marriages. Both bans were <u>upheld</u> by narrow majorities at a special General Conference in 2019, but have been widely flouted by United Methodists for many years.

The Episcopal Church is currently a full communion partner of six churches: the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the Moravian Church — Northern and Southern Provinces, the Mar Thoma Syrian Church of Malabar, the Old Catholic Churches of the Union of Utrecht, the Philippine Independent Church, and the Church of Sweden. <u>Resolution A037</u>, proposed for adoption at General Convention in June, would create a full communion relationship with a seventh partner, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Bavaria.

A BIG REVIVAL THANK YOU!

What a great day was had at Christ Church on Saturday, April 27th! This was thanks to the hard work of many Church volunteers.

The day began with an estimated 35-40 people joining out front to watch the annual Rhododendron Parade, enjoying hot cocoa, coffee, and doughnuts.



For our entry, Royal McCarthy was at the wheel of Harper Motors' 1930 Ford Model A Phaeton, chauffeuring Elizabeth Harper-Lawson, Heidi Erickson, and Catherine Mace. Fr. Daniel rode the running board or walked alongside, carrying a sign advertising our Revival events and our Joy Mass Family Service.

At 4:00 pm, Kathryne DeLorme spoke about Labyrinths to more than 50 people in the Heritage Room, unveiling our new portable Labyrinth, which Fr. Daniel blessed. Check In: I John 4:7-21 John implores us to love one another. Love is the choice to wish the good of the other: for them to be happy, healthy and at peace.

Rector's Report: Fr. Daniel's book on Spiritual Friendship is expected to come out this Summer. He will attend the 81st General Convention in late June in Louisville, Kentucky. Prior to convention Fr. Daniel will attend the meetings of the "Ecumenical & Interreligious Relations" Legislative Committee. While in the area, he will retreat in Trappist, Kentucky at the Abbey of Gethsemani associated with Thomas Merton, and stay at the Sisters of the Transfiguration in Cincinnati. Discussions are underway to do a Panel with HAPI, Humboldt Asians and Pacific Islanders in Solidarity.

Archdeacon's Report: Positive ripple effects from the Betty Chinn Book Signing Event and soup suppers continue. Pam listed details of individual and church growth explored in the Renewal Works Survey mentioned by Scott Gunn in his pre-revival talk: engagement with Scripture, deeper prayer life, heart of the leader, and transformative Eucharist.

Treasurer's Report and Finance Information: The treasurer says, "We are right on budget." While the General Operating Fund was down for March, it is up for the first quarter of the year overall. Financial Reports are posted in Lewis Hall. Full financial reports available upon request.

Chancel Lighting Retrofit Project

The chancel lighting retrofit project is another Green Project to help reduce our current energy bill with PG&E.

The new can lights are a white-light LED retrofit for our older incandescent ellipsoidal fixtures. The retrofit was a simple and quick upgrade; is nondestructive and takes less than a minute to install (*the manufacturer's words not the editor's words!*) This warm white retrofit is perfect for any venue looking for a white-light fixture with the efficiency of an LED but the same optics, accessories, and flexibility as the original fixture. The <u>retrofits use upwards of</u> <u>70% less power!</u>

HELENA OF CONSTANTINOPLE Protector of the Holy Places May 22

Most Merciful God, who blessed your servant Helena with such grace and devotion to you that she venerated the very footsteps of our Savior; may we too, assisted by her prayers and example, be given the same grace to always see your glory in the cross of your Son. Through the same Jesus Christ our Lord; who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

Helena was an Empress of Rome and devout Christian, but perhaps most renowned for her discoveries of holy sites related to the life of Jesus.

She was born into a lower class family in the middle of the 3rd century, though we are unsure about where. Many believe she was born in Drepana (now Helenopolis) in northern Asia Minor but this is uncertain. There are also later legends that place her birth in England, and for that she is honored with numerous holy wells across the country. Regardless of birthplace she would eventually become the wife, or at least consort, of Constantius I, who was coemperor and ruled over Gaul (France) and Britannia (Britain). During this time Helena would give birth to a son, Constantine, in the year 272, but she would soon be divorced and live in the East in the palace of Diocletian.

Once her son gained the Western Empire in the year 312, she returned to Rome and was granted the title Augusta, or Empress, in 325. It was during this time that she made her famous journey to the Holy Land to find the places mentioned in the Gospels, with the most important finds being the Cross of the Crucifixion and the site of the Resurrection.

Long after the destruction of Jerusalem in the year 70, the Emperor Hadrian had the area rebuilt. As part of this restoration a pagan temple was built on the very site of the Resurrection. Helena ordered this temple destroyed, had the area excavated, and discovered three crosses along with the epitaph that said, "Jesus, King of the Jews". To ensure it was truly the cross of Christ, a woman near death was carried to the site and touched each cross in turn. On the third one she was cured and Helena declared this to be the one. She ordered that a church be built which would be called the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, a major pilgrimage site to this day.

Regardless of the truth of the legend itself, it is certain that she claimed to have found this and many other holy sites and relics on her journey. Unfortunately, she would not see the completion of the Church of the Holy Sepulcher as she died in 330, five years before its completion.

Helena also had a reputation as a faithful Christian who cared for the poor. After her death several towns would be named in her honor and she would also eventually be given the title of "Equal to the Apostles". Helena's faith in her Lord was not a detached spirituality, but an embodied and historical one, such that she eagerly sought to find the very places where the Son of God had walked, taught, died, and rose again.


Christ Church Eureka Green Team Mission and Vision Statement

OUTREACH REPORT



<u>St. Vincent de Paul's Dining Facility</u> has been serving the homeless and low-income community in downtown Eureka for 43-years. Over 4-million hot meals have been served during this period. The Particular Council of the Redwood Council of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul operates the program which is located at 35 W. 3rd Street. Meals are served weekdays and more recently the last two Saturdays of the month.

By partnering with other outreach agencies, St. Vincent's provides access to additional services:

- weekday access for the street community to three shower rooms at a site managed by Betty Chinn;
- access to the St. Joseph Community Resource Center: clothing, footwear, winter-wear, hygiene kits, feminine care items, blankets, sleeping bags, ponchos, laundry cards, and personal mail distribution;
- primary healthcare and referrals through from Open Door Mobile Medical;
- Uplift Outreach for housing assistance, rehab referral, and personal ID recovery;
- HACHER & NARCAN and other substance abuse harm reduction items; and
- access to Tiny Shelters, two temporary units in the courtyard area for two or more seeking some sort of permanent housing.

The annual budget is in the category of a small budget NPO (nonprofit - \$350,000). Donations, grants and fund-raising provide income, but traditional sources have been impacted by COVID and the economy in general.

In particular, three major projects are high priority if and when funding can be raised:

- powder-coated ornamental fencing around the property, poured concrete in the dumpster storage area and repaving asphalt in the employee parking lot (\$65,000-\$80,000);
- payoff personal loan of \$150,000 made in 2013 by a Board member for the renovation of damaged property (which also had served as a major source of income); and
- provide a long overdue legacy bonus payment of \$100,000 for the 3 paid kitchen staff who earn only the state-mandated minimum wage. (Head Cook, 23 years; Assistant Cook, 9 years; Kitchen Assistant, 1 year).

How do and can we support St. Vincent's?

Christ Church for years has included St. Vincent's as one of the programs we support on a regular basis. We budget \$50 per month on a regular basis, and parishioners donate fresh produce each month on the 3rd Sunday, which is then delivered by Roni Carlson.
