***Who May Vote?** The Church Constitution, Section 3.1, states: Determination of Members; Voting Members

The members of this Parish shall be people who have received the Sacrament of Holy Baptism, whether in this or another Christian Church, whose baptisms have been recorded in this Church, and who meet such other criteria as are prescribed by the Canons of The Episcopal Church and the Diocese. All members sixteen years of age and over shall be considered adult members, provided that, only those members of legal age (i.e. at least 18) who, at the time of any Parish meeting, have been communicants of record and givers of record upon the records and books of this Parish for a minimum of six months and who have received Holy Communion in this Parish a minimum of three times in the preceding year shall be qualified to vote at said meeting. {NC I.17.1 and I.17.2; DC 36.3}

VESTRY CANDIDATE | Rich Baker | Candidate Questionnaire

1. What attributes or talents will you bring to the Vestry?

VESTRY CANDIDATE | Sharon Kalberer | Candidate Questionnaire

1. What attributes or talents will you bring to the Vestry?

I have been a member of Christ Episcopal Church for almost seven years. My spiritual journey began as a child in Texas as a Southern Baptist and then as a Catholic in 1965. I became an Episcopalian in 1994 after attending a small Episcopal church in Herndon, Virginia. I served on the Hospitality Committee with my husband at Christ the King Episcopal Church in Alpine, CA for 8 years and served on the Altar Guild, the Mission Council and Executive Committee of San Gabriel the Archangel Episcopal Church (a mission church) in Corrales, New Mexico for 2 years. From 2020 – 2023, I was a Vestry member here at Christ Episcopal Church. With this experience, I believe I am qualified to assist in making those important decisions that will impact our church.



I've traveled extensively, lived abroad for six years, and have cultivated friendships with folks of all different walks of life including those of different cultures and faiths. I believe these experiences have helped mold me into the person I am today: hopefully one who demonstrates compassion and love for those who need it; a willingness to serve in any way I can that will benefit this wonderful Church and a commitment to continue to grow as a Christian to serve our Lord.

Those who know me well, know that I am kind, compassionate, loving, and see that the glass is always half full. I am organized, reliable, committed, and a hard worker who likes to get things done. 2. What ministries have you participated in within the last two years at Christ Church?

VESTRY CANDIDATE | Merry Phillips | Candidate Questionnaire

My name is Merry Phillips and I have been a member in good standing at Christ Church for over ten years. I was confirmed in the Episcopal Church in 2006 at St. Alban's, Arcata. I am self-nominating for a position on the 2025 Christ Church Vestry.

1. Attributes or talents I will bring to the Vestry: I have good organizational skills as well as interpersonal and communication skills that I think will be an asset to the position. I am also self-aware and know that I am not perfect and am always trying to improve my listening and communication skills. I have a deep faith and belief in God, support the vision and mission of Christ Church, and believe that when we come together to consider what is best for Christ Church, we begin by asking for God's guidance.



2. Up until August 2024, I was the Organist and Music Coordinator at Christ Church, serving as a staff member for the past ten years. Along the way I have participated in different ministries (coffee hour, concert series, Music & Arts Camp, Foster Fridays, food pick-up at St. Joe's for Betty Chinn, etc.) and volunteered to help with various events. One of my favorite volunteer stints was to follow in Julie Cairns footsteps and coordinating the soup suppers for the programs on Betty Chinn's biography by Karen Price.

3. Christ Church membership is growing and changing. As we move forward it will be important to grow new leaders in the church to take on new ministries and or continue ministries already in place where perhaps a transition in leadership is happening. I am advocate of change, not for change's sake, but when it is discerned that a change is needed to benefit the whole. We need to constantly remind ourselves of our mission and core values of worship, discipleship, fellowship, outreach, and hospitality when considering which ministries need to grow and change or be let go.

VESTRY CANDIDATE | Steve Preston | Candidate Questionnaire

1. What attributes or talents will you bring to the Vestry?

I earned a 5-year Bachelor of Theology degree from Baptist Bible Seminary (the since re-named and recently closed Clarks Summit University) of Clarks Summit, PA. I am a Licensed Baptist Minister. I co-founded and led a Southern California, membership-based, evangelical Christian organization for Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, and Transgendered Christians from the late 1970s through the early 1990s, when it ceased operations. In that role, I provided both pastoral and administrative services, including supervising a large volunteer staff and chairing the Board of Directors. I was also an active volunteer member of the Spiritual Advisory Committee of AIDS Project Los Angeles, and was elected Coordinator of the Los Angeles Gay & Lesbian Religious Coalition. From 1992 until recently, I operated and co-owned, with my late husband Daniel, a graphic design and typography business (Good News Typesetting), which moved with us from Los Angeles. I am an organizer by nature and a pastor at heart.



2. What ministries have you participated in within the last two years at Christ Church?

After starting at Christ Church in mid-July 2019, following our move from Los Angeles, Dan and I became involved with the Coffee Hour Ministry, as Readers/Intercessors, and were going to become Ushers until the Covid-19 lockdown hit the very Sunday we were to begin!

I served on Vestry from 2021-2023 and was Senior Warden in 2022 and 2023. I currently chair the Green Team and the Stewardship Committee, serve on the Joy Mass and Labyrinth committees, am on the Livestream Team, am one of the Readers/Intercessors, and am an Usher. I also attend the monthly Staff and Worship Committee meetings on behalf of our Usher Captain, Sharon Kalberer. I was the Coordinator for the Christ Church Remote Location Events for the Diocesan Revival in Roseville, for other church projects, and was also the Deanery Representative for the local parish phase of the Diocesan Racial Justice Audit. I am a voice from Christ Church in the monthly Diocesan Leadership Calls, the Commission on the Environment, and the Commission for Intercultural Ministries. I am also the convener of the Diocesan Rainbow Ministry for 2S/LGBTQIA+ persons, with four other members of its distributed leadership team.

3. Which leadership area do you believe you could help grow, expand and be an advocate for?

In addition to supporting the ministries of our Rector and other clergy, and the existing lay ministries, I particularly look forward to supporting our moves toward carbon neutrality by 2030 (as mandated by General Convention and by our own Annual Convention in 2022). I also hope to work together on Vestry to expand our Lay Ministry Leadership so that “many hands can make light work,” and to involve new members more in the lay ministries of the church. I look forward to advancing our efforts at increasing diversity within our church, reaching out to marginalized members of our community. And I look forward to finding additional effective ways of bringing the Gospel message and our supportive community to our larger community in Humboldt County. In other words, I hope to help find effective means of outreach that bring people into the warm embrace of this loving and accepting community of believers, and into the acceptance of the grace of God in Jesus Christ.

Within every challenge lies opportunity! The task is to find the opportunity and to fulfill it!

VESTRY CANDIDATE | Sheena Ruchte | Candidate Questionnaire

1. What attributes or talents will you bring to the Vestry?

I am very enthusiastic to be of service to Christ Church's mission and vision in whatever way I can, and hope that I can lend my time and talents to the Vestry. I pray to be of better service to God and the Church always. I bring with me a spirit of cooperation, compassion, and love in working with others. I have administrative skills developed working in an optical office for several years, including computer literacy, organizational skills, ability to communicate effectively oral and written, time management, ability to work as a team, attention to detail, and high standards for quality of work. I have been training as Acolyte and helping with the Altar Guild. I feel so grateful to be able to learn so much in both these ministries and learning about each enriches the other. I have also been participating in the Labyrinth walks as an Artist-in-Presence, helping with the art table at the monthly Labyrinth walks.

3. Which leadership area do you believe you could help grow, expand, and be an advocate for?

Prayer and worship at Christ Church have been such a blessing and instrumental in growing in my faith. COMMUNITY OF THE TRANSFIGURATION – Stephanie Schultz, Oblate

Annual Report: Community of the Transfiguration You may have asked or thought, "What is the Community of the Transfiguration?" This article will give a little history and an update of our local Associate community and our activities of 2024.

"We are Episcopal women living in Community under the vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience dedicated to the mystery of the Transfiguration. We are called by God to live, pray, and serve with kindness, simplicity, and joy. In our lives together, we strive to live a healthy monastic discipline, which includes respect and consideration for each Sister. We seek God's grace and ongoing guidance for our lives and ministries." (*This taken from Sisters of the Transfiguration brochure*)



The community is in Cincinnati, Ohio and has been in existence since 1898. There are many ministries the sisters have created. They include: Bethany School, St. Monica's Recreation Center, Transfiguration Spirituality Center, Food for the Soul. The community has had ministries around the world, in Japan, China, the Dominican Republic, Bat Cave, NC, and here in Eureka, California. Transfiguration House was in existence until 2017 and is where our rector currently resides.

What is an Associate of the Transfiguration? They are women and men, lay and ordained, who are offered an opportunity to participate in the spiritual life of the Community while continuing to serve God in their work and other obligations. Associates are an integral part of the Community and share in its ministry of prayer and service. They are held in prayer by the Sisters and support the lives and ministries of the Community by their prayers. Retreats, intercessions, spiritual guidance are all available to Associates, as is the mutual support and encouragement of area Associate organizations. (from *What does it mean to be an Associate of the Community of the Transfiguration?*)

There are also Oblates of the Community who share a greater involvement and relationship with the sisters in Cincinnati. Some live, work and volunteer at the convent. All oblates visit the Community regularly.

Last July, Sister Jacqueline and Toni, an oblate of the Community, visited Eureka for a week. Sister was tickled she got to know the local associates. The visit was begun by Christ Church member Lin Chase being received as an associate at the 10:30 service on July 21. Our guests visited Deacon Ann outdoors at her place. A highlight

was a visit to Camp Living Waters by Sister Jacqueline, Toni, and Stephanie. The camp theme was Super Heroes and day was focused on Transfiguration and the community. Many wonderful events have occurred demonstrating our Core Values (*Worship, Discipleship, Fellowship, Outreach, and Hospitality*). And much has happened behind the scenes making these events possible. John 21:25 comes to mind:

ACOLYTES & EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS – Royal McCarthy

When we come together to worship, Acolytes and Eucharistic Ministers (EMs) serve two vital roles. Acolytes mainly assist the celebrant (priest in charge of the worship service) and Deacons in setting up the altar. The Eucharistic Minister is a lay person authorized to administer the chalice. These are important ministries and participation in these important roles help us all to glorify God.

At the 8:00 service, there is an Acolyte and one Eucharistic Minister. Most of the Acolytes that serve at the 8:00 service are also licensed Eucharistic Ministers. The duties of the Acolyte include lighting the candles, receiving the plate offering from the usher and assisting the Celebrant or Deacon with setting up the elements for Holy Eucharist.



At the 10:30 service, the acolyte is the crucifer (Cross Bearer) in addition to lighting the candles, receiving the plate offering and assisting the Celebrant or Deacon. There will be two Eucharistic Ministers at the 10:30 service, one of which could be the Acolyte as well.

I would like to thank all those who are currently serving as Acolytes and Eucharistic Ministers for their dedication and willingness to serve.

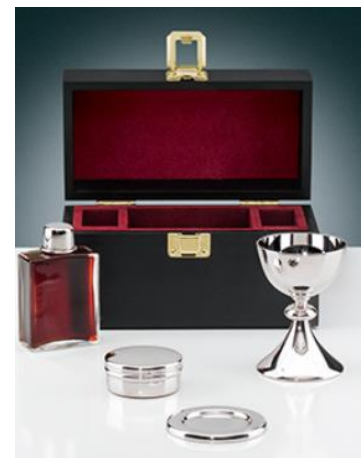

ALTAR GUILD – Katherine Clague, Director

The Altar Guild is responsible for all services at Christ Church; on Sundays we have two services in the main church, and Joy Mass in the Chapel. The Joy Mass is set-up by Elizabeth Harper-Lawson and Robin Cardona. For the main church we have rotating teams who set-up on Saturday. We straighten up the nave, dust the chancel, polish the vessels and the brass rails, fill or replace candles, prepare the credence table for communion: iron the credence cloth, placing on the water and wine cruets, the lavabo and towel and a ciborium and/or bread box.

Then we prepare the Altar for the Sunday morning service: for the altar: remove the protector cloth, assure that the Fair Linen is clean and pressed, and placed atop the Frontal properly. The Paraments: Altar Frontal, pulpit & lectern falls (or Bible markers), and the priest's chasuble & stole all match and change with the liturgical colors of the church year.



We are ready to set the Altar: the Missal stand to the left side, the Gospel Book center front turned to the correct gospel for the day, and to either side of that the Eucharistic candles. In the sacristy we 'dress the chalice' placing a purificator on the chalice; the paten with priest's host upon this; on the paten the pall, carry this out and place in the center of the Altar. We then place the veil and the burse (which contains an extra purificator [upper left corner] and the corporal [folded with top folded over the embroidered cross in the front third near the hem]). Note the burse and veil match the Paraments of the day. We place a bulletin open to communion: The Great Thanksgiving one for the Deacon and one for the Eucharistic Minister.

We then distribute bulletins to the Altar party, extra one is placed on the chair for the reader, it is turned to the psalm. Place the lectionary book on the Lectern turned to the readings appointed for the day. Last, we place a glass of water by the Priest (s) and the Deacon and one on the pulpit.

We take the alms basins to the back-credence table for the ushers. And put the book for the prayers of the people and the bulletins for the service.

Between services we clear the Altar: wash the vessels, wash & iron the linens and fill the Eucharistic & torch candles. Then reset the Altar for the 10:30 service.

For Easter and Christmas, we take an 'all-hands on deck' approach and members help each other's teams during these busy liturgical seasons

2024 we added Barbara Walser and Beth Haynes, and I am pleased to announce that Sheena Ruchte and Carrie Moses are joining us. And on that note I am sad to say long-time member Sara Hines needs to step aside for medical reasons, but hopes to return when they are resolved.

Members of the committee are responsible for most of the activities required to produce a concert, including selection of guest artists, concert planning, publicity, accommodating the guest artists, ushering, and providing the receptions that follow most of the concerts. Members of the Stream Team volunteer for audio-visual support and other parishioners volunteer to help usher. The Office Administrator provides valuable logistical support. As we are fond of saying, “it takes a village!”

We had great concert attendance over the past year and generous door donations. Door donations (which usually average ca. \$12-15 person) do not cover the expenses of concerts with invited guest artists. Fees for concert performers range from \$1500 to \$3,000 and they will keep going up. Thanks to several generous individual donors this past year (\$3,096.71) we were able to break even this year. In addition, many “In Kind”

donations were given to cover the costs of lodging, receptions, gifts, local transportation, and meals for guest artists. Thank you to all who generously gave of your time and talent and supported the series through “in kind” and/or financial gifts in 2024!

The Sundays at 4 concerts are offered for free to the community and free will donations have been generous. Performers are not usually paid for these concerts; though sometimes the donations are shared with the musicians who have incurred costs to perform at the church.

Committee Housekeeping:

The committee reviewed its purpose and relationship to other Christ Church ministries during the year. To that purpose, we:

- Worked on a new Vision/Mission statements to clarify purpose of concert series and
- Established a Fundraising subcommittee.

Other Concerts at Christ Church:

The Church continues to provide a venue for performances for local performing groups. A major change in the procedures occurred this past year. A new Facilities Request Form and a Revised Fee Schedule were created by a Vestry Committee. All requests now go through the Church Office. The Request Form and Fee Schedule should be posted on the web site. This new procedure will still require a person from the church to be assigned a concert facilitator to coordinate scheduling and other details. This work was previously taken on by the Music Coordinator in a voluntary capacity.

Goals we’ve set for 2025:

- Fundraising
- Create ways to make donations and purchase tickets online for concerts
- Create a way to take debit/credit cards at the door for donations
- Transition to new committee leadership and recruit new committee members and volunteers for concerts.

I would like to offer heartfelt thanks to everyone who has been involved in the Christ Church Concert Series over the past 16+ years! It is fulfilling to participate in this endeavor and be a part of the ministry of hospitality Christ Church offers through these concerts. Please consider becoming involved in the Christ Church Concert Series in 2025! We have already begun the year with an outstanding organ concert by Adam Brakel and there will be more to come!

- ✓ The Red Book of contacts and emergency is being updated.

- ✓ Vestry encouraged to purchase a defibrillator and arrange training for its use.
- ✓ List of parishioners trained in Emergency Response Procedures is being updated.

The CA Violence Prevention Law (SB553) mandates the creation of a Congregational Violence Prevention Plan (CVPP) and also categorizes the various types of threats. The CVPP must be accessible to all employees or volunteers at the congregation. This can be done via email, personal conversation, text message or phone call.

The Diocese wants each church to produce a CVPP as required by new legislation SB553

The Diocese is setting up a program to make this process easy. To date they have not come back with details.

FOOD FOR PEOPLE | The Food Bank for Humboldt County – Bev Olson

While the first Sunday of each month is set aside for One Can Sunday, I check the Food Bank basket each Sunday for donations. You are welcome to bring one can every Sunday. Most Sundays there is at least a few cans, but lately the basket has been empty.

GREEN TEAM

Christ Church Green Team Mission & Vision Statement: *In fulfillment of Diocesan Resolution RI-2022, General Convention Resolution A087, and our church mission statement, the Christ Church Green Team promotes care for the earth and its resources as God's gifts for sustaining life. We strive to minimize the environmental footprint of the parish and its people by honoring the land and practicing mindful stewardship of our planet and its resources. As Christ Church Eureka, we seek to provide a carbon neutral presence by the year 2030. (Approved by Vestry)*



The Green Team was formed in spring of 2023, to guide Christ Church on its path to carbon neutrality. It promotes care for the earth and its resources as God's gifts for sustaining life. Green Team members are Fr. Daniel London, Heidi Erickson (Jr. Warden & Facilities Team Leader), Beth Haynes (Scribe), Ian Haynes (Vestry member), Jim Hendry (former Jr. Warden), Perry Gray-Reneberg, and Steve Preston (Chair and former Sr. Warden).

In April 2024, the Green Team received the Energy Study prepared by Energy for Purpose. It provides an overview of changes that Christ Church can undertake to reduce energy consumption and eventually make Christ Church a carbon neutral site. The Green Team reviewed the study and worked over the summer to implement some of the changes and to create an action plan for full implementation. The Carbon Neutrality Action Plan was delivered to the Vestry in November. Vestry voted to receive the Action Plan without any changes.

Even before the action plan was written, changes to lighting were implemented that made for an immediate significant reduction in monthly electricity bills—the incandescent chandelier lights have been replaced with LEDs, as have the halogens in the sanctuary. The Green Team established an Action Plan Implementation Team, under the Green Team, composed of Beth Haynes and retired engineers Ian Haynes and Royal McCarthy, to oversee the implementation of the Action Plan, with appropriate Vestry action when expenditures or contracts are involved.

Green Team “Tip of the Month” articles in the *Chronicle* offer suggestions for incorporating creation care into our everyday actions—both at home and at church. In 2024, tips included reducing paper consumption through the use of bamboo toilet paper and using tablets or prayer books instead of printed church bulletins, saving energy and reducing wear and tear on clothing by line-drying laundry, reducing fuel consumption by keeping tires properly inflated, using the Environmental Working Group (EWG) phone app to find the most eco-friendly products when shopping, taking re-usable containers to restaurants to bring home leftovers, and washing and reusing plastic bags. The Tip of the Month even included a few gift ideas.

The Creation Care Fund, created by Vestry in 2023 to provide a place for parishioners to make dedicated donations for environmentally related expenses at Christ Church Eureka, has a current balance of \$1,901.00.

The Green Team continues to explore other projects, large and small, “to promote care for the earth and its resources as God's gifts for sustaining life, and to minimize the environmental footprint of the parish and its people by honoring the land and practicing mindful stewardship of our planet and its resources.”

As we identify projects to fulfill the Action Plan or promote care for the earth and its resources, we will need volunteers to work to accomplish those projects. Please contact any Team member to volunteer for future Green Team Projects.

JOY MASS FAMILY SERVICE – Vickie Patton & Robin Cardona

September brought our second year of our new ministry of Joy Mass. This is a wonderful short service designed for families, young children, and adults young at heart. We provide lots of music, calendar time, storytelling, communion, and snacks.

This year we have had several families join us on a regular basis as well as a few occasional visitors. On average 4 or 5 children attend as well as 8-10 adults attend regularly.

This year we have been visited by the Bishop and St. Nicholas who left coins in our shoes. We had a White Elephant gift swap. We have waited together for Jesus, followed the Wise men, and learned about wondrous miracles.

LABYRINTH COMMITTEE – Kathryn DeLorme, Veriditas Certified Labyrinth Facilitator

The Committee's Early Days

The Labyrinth Committee began meeting in October 2022. Our original objective was to begin planning for an outdoor Prayer Labyrinth.

The current members are Fr. Daniel, Steve Preston, Royal McCarthy, Peg Gardner, Heidi Erickson, Elizabeth Harper-Lawson, and Cynthia Packard.

We began by discussing various options for the type and size of the labyrinth as well as options for building materials. We evaluated the best way to prepare and utilize the lawn area for the installation of our labyrinth. I presented examples of numerous labyrinths around the country, focusing on church labyrinths both indoor and outdoor.



While some members of Christ Church have personal experience with labyrinth walking, it was agreed our parishioners would enjoy learning more about labyrinth history and uses. I gave four presentations on labyrinth history titled, "History and Mystery of the Labyrinth," in order to create more awareness of the many benefits that having a labyrinth would bring to Christ Church as well as the wider Humboldt community.

The Times Standard published my article announcing this series of Power Point presentations during our Advent Soup Suppers in November and December of 2022. (The final one was postponed to February of 2023 due to the December 20th earthquake.)

Consultations with Professionals

I visited 13 labyrinths in surrounding counties and reported with slides to the committee on the types and construction. We then consulted with two professional labyrinth builders, Lars Howlett of the Veriditas organization in the Bay Area (where I trained as a Facilitator and which was founded by the Rev. Dr. Lauren Artress at Grace Cathedral), and William Frost, a labyrinth designer in Mendocino County. We received estimates from both for their range of services.

These consultations helped us realize the level of professional expertise required to create a beautiful, durable, low maintenance labyrinth for the various ways we envision using it. This includes having it available to the community at any time for personal prayer walks as well as for worship services, weddings, memorials, children's activities, and as a focal element for retreats and workshops.

Break from Monthly Meetings

We took a break from our monthly meetings while Fr. Daniel was on sabbatical and I was recovering from surgery.

Portable Labyrinth Events

Our labyrinth building information gathering process evolved into the decision to purchase the portable labyrinth to give more people the actual experience of walking a Prayer Labyrinth. This canvas labyrinth was introduced at the Revival last April during which a local harpist, Linda Dionne, played for the walkers. Two of our parishioners, Leslie Allen and David Lochtie, worked at their easels near the labyrinth painting scenes from the walk. These beautiful paintings now hang in the Heritage Room. At this event I gave an Introductory talk on labyrinth history and practices as participants sat in chairs around our new labyrinth.

It was a joy to watch the walkers on the paths, pausing reverently in the center, and returning by way of the same path, gently passing others going in the opposite direction.

We offered the Labyrinth Walk again in May 2024 as an official participant the World Labyrinth Day Peace Walk. (Every May thousands of people around the world walk labyrinths at 1:00 in their time zone with prayers

for peace. The motto for the event is, “We Walk As One at 1.” This was the 15th Annual World Labyrinth Day Peace Walk and we joined people from many countries for this event.)

These first two events drew dozens of walkers which showed a high level of interest in this practice and demonstrated how a labyrinth can be a source of community building.

We look forward to participating again this year in the World Labyrinth Day Peace Walk, Saturday May 3rd.

The Labor of Laying Out the Labyrinth

Steve Preston developed expertise at attaching the labyrinth to the Heritage Room carpet with double-sided tape. It is a challenging labor-intensive feat requiring an hour or more and he has created a specific strategy for unpacking the labyrinth, positioning on the floor, and meticulously applying the tape to secure it so that it does not wrinkle or buckle as the visitors walk the paths. We are gradually training others to assist Steve or to take over this vital task if he is unavailable.

Mike Robnett took over this duty while Steve was away last fall. Mike has been coming when the walk is over at 5pm to take it up and pack it away or help Steve with this.

More Consultation

In August 2024, I consulted with, Kevin Hawkins, a member of St. Luke’s Episcopal Church in Woodland, about details of their outdoor labyrinth construction. He helped oversee the project and provided many helpful descriptions of their building process. I submitted to our committee a four-page report on my discussion with Kevin which provided us with a vision for how our volunteer crew will work under the supervision of Royal McCarthy.

Monthly Labyrinth Walks Begin

In August, 2024, I offered to facilitate a monthly Labyrinth Walk to create a consistent opportunity for both experienced and new walkers. We have continued these walks on the third Saturday of each month with calendar listings in the Times Standard, North Coast Journal, My Humboldt Life, and Lost Coast Outpost. These listings in local media are bringing participants from McKinleyville to Fortuna.

We purchased a banner from Scrapper’s Edge which reads, “Labyrinth Walk Sat. 2-5 pm” which we began posting outside on the Joy Mass sign several days each month before the 3rd Saturday Labyrinth Walk. Several visitors report they came for the walk after seeing the sign.

Sometimes they’re familiar with labyrinths but sometimes are simply curious about this form of prayer or walking meditation.

Facilitating the Walks, Display Tables, Music

My role in facilitating the Heritage Room Walk is to greet all as they arrive, inquire if they are familiar with labyrinths and to offer basic guidance if they desire.

I note their names and how they learned of our event, and I invite them to share any reflections after their experience in our *Labyrinth Walk Reflection Journal* which is posted next to the labyrinth on the podium. Most enjoy having this opportunity to share something about their walk.

My role gives me the opportunity to make connections with people who have never been to Christ Church and may have questions about our services.

I also set up two display tables in the Heritage Room. One is for books about labyrinths to browse, various handouts on labyrinth history and practices, a Donation Box, and forms to fill out with contact information if they want to be notified of future labyrinth events or general Christ Church activities.

A second table is a display of four wooden finger labyrinths and information about how they are an alternative to walking a floor labyrinth. These finger labyrinths can be used by participants who are unable to walk with their feet! Several visitors have taken advantage of this option and “walked” a finger labyrinth while seated next to the portable labyrinth, enjoying the same peaceful environment.

During the period from 2 pm to 5pm, I play a CD of harp music. The harpist, Linda Dionne, has said she would like to play for our walks as often as her schedule permits. We have offered her compensation but she declines as she wants to freely offer her music to enhance the labyrinth walkers' experience. We are considering donating to the Bell Choir she leads at the Methodist Church.

These monthly walks have drawn between 14 and 35 walkers. I believe as more people in our community, both parishioners and residents, discover the peace and healing reflections gained by walking the labyrinth, they will be returning often to our events, knowing that the 3rd Saturday of each month they can join us.

Our Chapel Labyrinth

In addition to the labyrinth in the Heritage Room, we are now making the Chapel Labyrinth available for anyone wanting to walk it instead, or for those who require the use of a walker or cane which cannot be accommodated on the portable labyrinth. Elizabeth is graciously overseeing the Chapel Walk during the same time, 2-5pm, that the Heritage Room labyrinth is available. Some people choose to walk both labyrinths.

Labyrinth Art Activities and Social Gathering

In addition to our labyrinth walks, we are now creating the opportunity for the participants to join our Artists-in-Residence, Sheena Ruchte and Cynthia Packard, at tables in Lewis Hall for Labyrinth Art activities. We provide art supplies and printed labyrinth patterns for coloring or writing reflections around the pathways.

We are also serving tea, coffee, and light snacks for those who want to get creative at the art tables or simply join those gathered around for art and conversation.

Both Sheena and Cynthia provide inspiration and a congenial ambiance to this gathering for labyrinth walkers to share their experiences.

Cynthia has stepped into role of kitchen duty, artfully assembling an array of healthy finger foods.

Preparing Materials for the Consultant

Currently we are preparing photos, videos, our Site Plan, and other data to send to Lars Howlett, the Labyrinth Builder we plan to use who will develop the most appropriate design for our site and provide building plans for our labyrinth. We intend to recruit our volunteers for the actual construction in late spring or summer.

Fundraising

We have also been discussing a variety of fundraising projects. When we receive information from the Labyrinth Builder, we will have a more accurate estimate of how much we need to raise.

Our parishioner and fine artist, Sheena Ruchte, has offered to create several labyrinth-themed paintings that can be used as part of our fundraising efforts. We believe several other artists will join in this effort by donating their work.

We have considered items that can be sold, other items as "gifts" that will be given for a specific donation amount, and offering the purchase of "Memorial Bricks."

It was suggested at our last meeting that we might apply for grants from the Diocese programs for Creation Care or Evangelism or perhaps from the National level.

There have already been some donations to the Labyrinth Fund.

Registering our New Labyrinths

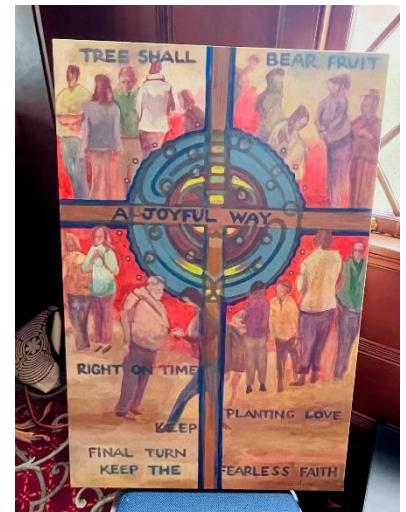
The Labyrinth Society maintains a website, labyrinthlocator.com, that has over 6,000 labyrinths worldwide registered. By entering a location, labyrinths in that area are listed with contact information about their type and availability. Our Chapel Labyrinth has been on this registry for several years, and I will be adding our portable labyrinth walks to the site. Hopefully later in 2025, we can register our beautiful outdoor labyrinth as well. We will have three labyrinths to offer to local walkers as well as travelers who seek out labyrinths wherever they go.

Our Goal is in Sight!

For over two years (minus a break) we have been methodically striving to work toward our goal of creating an outdoor labyrinth that will serve to extend our ministry in numerous ways. We believe it will be a blessing not only to Christ Church, but will be a source of healing and tranquility for all who come to walk our Outdoor Prayer Labyrinth at any time.

MUSIC PROGRAM – Avery Alexander & Merry Phillips | Music Coordinator and Organist

2024 has been a year of transition and change for our music program. Shortly after he returned from his sabbatical in 2023, I told Fr. Daniel that I would like to retire within a couple of years or when a new Organist & Music Coordinator could be hired. A Search Committee was formed soon after and they worked hard and diligently with a successful result! It was a delight to welcome Avery Alexander in August 2024.

While each ‘last’ event, special service, Chronicle article, etc. was bittersweet, I was always reminded of the amazing amount of support and love I have been given during my tenure at Christ Church. At Christ Church we share our time, talent, and treasure in many ways. Our Vestry is committed to increasing our outreach to our neighbors locally and throughout the wider world.

- Welcoming families in our community with young children to our new weekly Joy Mass Family Service at 9:30 each Sunday in the Chapel.
- Continuing to provide and enhance our online presence through streaming services, weekly emails, social media posts.
- Sending regular monthly financial donations to: Food for People (Food Bank); TFI (The Forgotten Initiative) (local foster children and youth); Betty Chinn’s Homeless Foundation; and Sandy-in-Honduras (medical assistance for physical disabilities for children and youth in Honduras).
- Increasing our regular monthly outreach donations to include the Eureka Rescue Mission.
- Collecting non-perishable food donations for those with food insecurity weekly and especially on the first Sunday of the month, delivered to Food for People by Bev Olson.
- Donating fresh produce on the third Sunday for the noon dining program at St. Vincent de Paul, delivered by Roni Carlson.
- Crafting prayer quilts for parishioners in need of comfort and healing and making fleece blankets (throws) for children and youth entering foster care during monthly meetings of Quilters Plus.
- Collecting consumable supplies for kitchen and hygiene use for the Deanery summer camp, Camp Living Waters in Redwood Valley and providing some volunteers.
- Providing new underwear and socks for Betty Chinn to distribute to homeless middle and high school students to enable them to participate actively in physical education classes.
- Ordering back-to-school backpacks and filling them with school supplies for Betty Chinn’s outreach program.

- Inviting the community to share in a variety of musical offerings and concerts, including several that feature the Kegg organ.
- Supporting Discretionary Funds for Fr. Daniel, Archdeacon Pam, and Deacon Anne to enable them to respond to urgent needs of parishioners and others.
- Initiating planning for the February 2024 Book Launch at Christ Church for the community to celebrate with Betty Kwan Chinn and parishioner and biographer Karen M. Price, the publication of The Gray Bird Sings: The Extraordinary Life of Betty Kwan Chinn. Book proceeds benefited the Betty Kwan Chinn Homeless Foundation.
- Responding to Betty Chinn's call for volunteers to assist with Betty's Community Christmas dinner with about 40 who answered her invitation.

Stewardship Committee Annual Report for 2024

God calls each one of us to be good stewards. God calls us to care for all of God's creation: the world in which we live, the environment, its creatures, and our fellow human beings. The Scriptures tell us of all that we have been given and how, with grateful and generous hearts, we too should give. Jesus Christ calls us all to be good stewards, to build up the realm of God as we share our gifts with others, and care for those in need. The Stewardship Committee works to remind us of this call. Each year, the Stewardship Committee asks us to think about our Christian commitment, and to prayerfully consider what we might offer back to God through offerings and through the ministry of our parish church.

The members of the Stewardship Committee are Fr. Daniel London, Katherine Clague, Peg Gardner (Pledge Secretary), Elizabeth Harper-Lawson, Beth Haynes (Secretary and Interim Chair), Ian Haynes, Jim Hendry, Royal McCarthy, Steven Preston (Chair), and Annalee Veach. Marty Vega assisted with planning and producing the Lay Ministry Fair.

In 2024, the Stewardship Committee took on three initiatives: the Annual Pledge Campaign; the Lay Ministry Fair; and the Project (Re)Stock (Re)Start Bins campaigns in October and during Advent.

In preparation for **the Annual Pledge Campaign**, the committee reviewed the annual campaign materials provided by the Episcopal Network for Stewardship (TENS), alongside a publication on stewardship titled *New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program* by Herb Miller. TENS materials were themed *Walk-in-Love*. Committee members agreed to try a hybrid program that included materials provided by TENS and followed the timeline described in *New Consecration Sunday*, including a one-day Stewardship Event. After a month of written and spoken publicity items, ***Walk-in-Love Sunday*** was held on November 17, 2024 and featured a single service at 9:30 am, with guest preacher the Rev. Aidan Rontani, Rector, All Saints Church, Redding, followed by a formal Celebratory Luncheon that was funded as part of the Stewardship budget.

The Lay Ministry Fair was held following both the 8:00 and 10:30 services on October 20th. A booklet was produced for the event in which leaders of many of the Christ Church Lay Ministries provided an overview of their ministry. During the Lay Ministry Fair, parishioners were invited to meet with Lay Ministry Leaders at tables in the Heritage Room and to consider whether they could offer their time and talents to support one or more of the Christ Church Lay Ministries.

Through **the Project (Re)Stock (Re)Start Bins** collection in October, donations to fill 5 bathroom bins and 5 bedroom bins were received. An additional 5 bins each were filled during the Advent Season and Christmastide. These bins are part of the **Diocesan Project (Re)Start** program in which parishes throughout the diocese collect prescribed items and make up bins of practical supplies to help victims of natural disasters or fires within our diocese. The bins we fill at Christ Church are stored in the basement until the diocese calls for them to be distributed. Bins that were re-filled in late 2023 were distributed to victims of the fires in the summer of 2024. Bins filled through our Project (Re)Stock (Re)Start Bins collection will be available for the next call.

And finally, the Stewardship Committee met on December 6, 2024 to evaluate these three projects, and we began discussions of 2025 projects, including refinements to the Pledge Campaign for next year.

Compensation Ranges include a 4.80% COLA approved by the Board of Trustees (BoT) for 2025. The COLA is recommended to parishes to adopt. The board understands not all parishes will be able to pay this full amount. They encourage parishes to offer what they can.

Compensation Ranges include: regular salary, housing, allowance for social security, etc. The ranges do not Report line items: include health insurance, travel, pension, education, etc.

Transitional Deacon should be paid at 90% of Range "B" Base (100% when ordained a priest).

Diocesan executive staff are paid at Range "E"; program staff are paid per hire letter.

All other ordained clergy, if employed by a congregation must be compensated at Range "B" or greater. This is prorated based on full time equivalent.

For regional missionaries combine total points from each church. Below 120 points, minimum is Range "B" Base plus \$1,500. For 120 points and higher, minimum is Range "C" Base plus \$1,500. Maximum is Range "C".

For Congregations receiving assistance, maximum clergy salary is Range "B" Base.

Activity Statement December 2024

For the year ending December 31, 2024 the General Operating Fund surplus was \$54,839, \$57,329 more than budgeted.

1. General Operating Fund income for the twelve months ending December 31 was \$392,853, \$46,591 more than budgeted.
 - Pledge offerings for the twelve months ending December 31 were \$303,821, \$37,401 more than budgeted.
 - Plate and other giving offerings for the twelve months ending December 31 were \$44,656, \$7,173 more than budgeted.
 - Investment income for the twelve months ending December 31 was \$14,998, \$1,998 more than budgeted.
 - Rental income for the twelve months ending December 31 was \$26,204, \$1,656 less than budgeted. This was a significant drop and is attributable to the effects of both maintenance costs and annual property tax paid on both Smullin House and the Apartment.
 - In other income, the church received a tax refund from Humboldt County of \$1,621.06 settling a dispute of over-assessment of church property in the church's favor.
2. General Operating Fund costs for the twelve months ending December 31 were \$338,014, \$10,738 less than budgeted.
 - Personnel costs for the twelve months ending December 31 were \$180,657, \$1,322 more than budgeted. The increased deficit in personnel costs is attributable to maintenance costs for the Rectory.
 - Occupancy costs for the twelve months ending December 31 were \$56,616, \$7,684 less than budgeted.
 - Gas and electricity for the twelve months ending December 31 were \$16,227, \$7,073 less than budgeted. Primarily because of the church's investment in conversion to LED lighting. However, as the weather has turned colder it is evident that the church's gas consumption is rapidly increasing, and those costs could overtake the savings in electricity.
 - Other General operating costs for the twelve months ending December 31 were \$24,316, \$1,694 less than budgeted.

1. The projections forecast a deficit for 2025 of \$1,489.
2. Pledge income is based on pledges received as of 1/10/25.
3. The Vestry approved the COLA increase of 4.8% recommended by the Diocese for all employees.
4. Several accounts have had budget increases of 5% or more. In the case of Gas and Electricity the budget was increased by 20%. As noted elsewhere in this report, Christ Church has invested in changes that have significantly reduced our electricity consumption. However, the price of gas for heating has risen dramatically over the past year and prudence demands we be prepared for further cost increases.

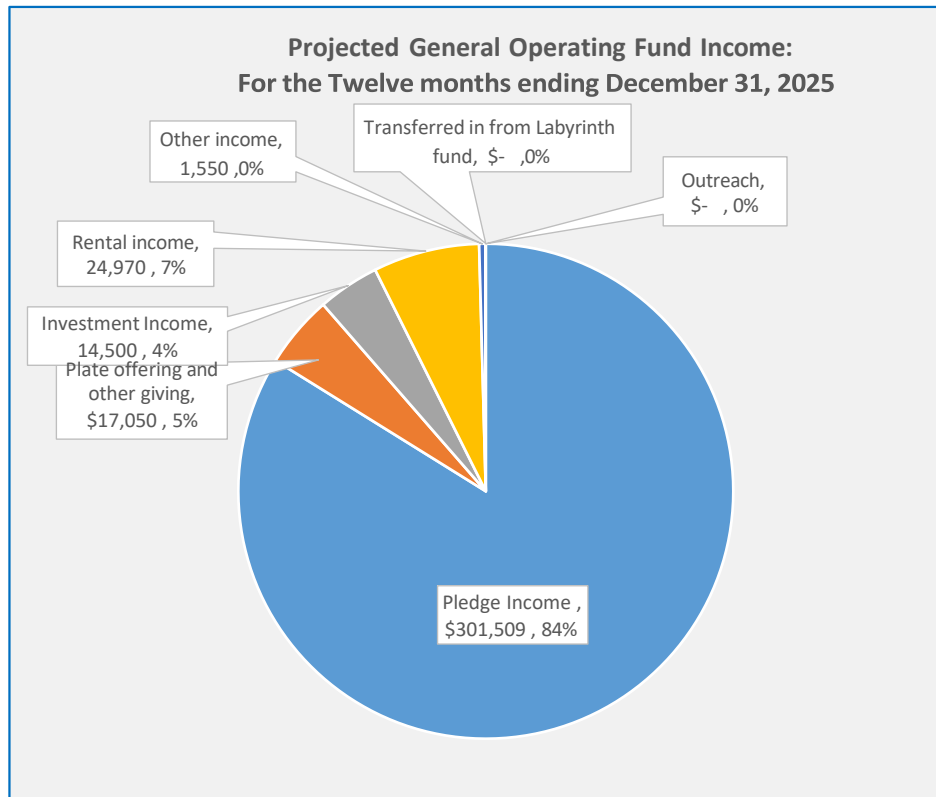
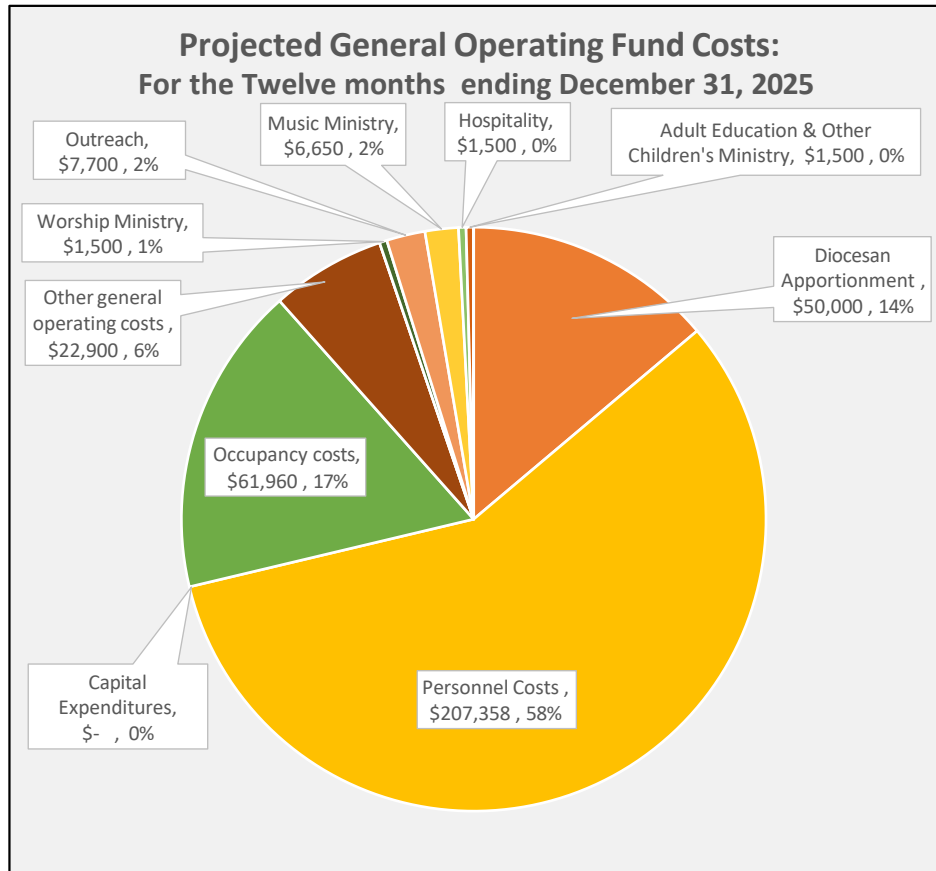
